## Road Report

With summer here, the road department is into full swing with their summer projects.

The crusher is working at the Skinner Creek site and stockpiling rock for the Willow Creek Road project. It will be crushing 100,000 yards of rock for this project.

The past two weeks crushed rock from the Rietmann Quarry has been applied to several roads north of lone. Stockpiling of rock is in progress for sealing of eight miles on lone-Gooseberry road.

The 3.5 miles of widening and reconstruction of Rhea Creek road for stabilization and dust control on July 20.

Patching of many roads has been in progress the last three weeks with completion of work the next couple of weeks.

The 3.5 miles of widening and reconstruction of Wilson Road has been completed and ready for stripping.

Dust abatement will be applied to 3 miles of Rhea Creek road for stabilization and dust control on July 20.

## Pest and disease management Garden club topic

"Backyard Pest and Disease Management" was discussed at a round table at the lone Garden Club meeting on Wednesday July 13 at the home of Loree Hubbard. It was stressed that good garden hygiene and soil health can be the best way to handle this problem. One should use biological and physical controls

and natural sprays if possible. Some suggestions for control were: 1) use a bright yellow board covered with a sticky material to attract and trap insects; 2) use insecticide soapy water for spray; 3) spray with seaweed or fish emulsion for the metodes; 4) control slugs by using a spray high in nitrogen content because it forms an enzyme slugs dislike or circle plants with a gritty material such as sand or cinders or make a barrier of 1/4" hardware

cloth because slugs won't cross sharp obstacles. To control moles and gophers one might not used cat litter in their runs or fresh Juicy Fruit gum or castor beans. Good air circulation will help control diseases also.
