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Mahoney successful in bid for office

Mike Mahoney was successful this last week in Pueblo, Colo. in his run for vice president of the National High School Rodeo Association (NHSRA). Mike was a contestant in calf roping and steer wrestling as well as running for national office. He placed 23rd in calf roping out of 146 contestants. Two others were running for this office, a girl from South Dakota and a boy from Minnesota.

All week long during the National High School Rodeo finals, the candidates campaigned for office. Saturday, they presented their speeches to 1400 kids attending the NHSRA and Sunday the elections were held.

In his speech, Mike stated that "I would like to keep the high quality of rodeo stock that they have always had and am interested in acquiring more scholarships." This year \$110,000 in scholarships were given out to contestants.

The officers of the NHSRA will be attending the National FFA convention in Kansas City and also go to the National Finals Rodeo in Las Vegas. Last year's officers attended the Winter Olympics.

Oregon made a good showing this year at the finals. They now have a National Champion in the Boys Cow Cutting, David Hansen of Redmond. Cindi Yeager of Milton-Freewater placed third in barrel racing. "Oregon was well-represented, I

Poe receives bid on Willow Creek Project

Morrow County Judge Louis Carlson received word last week that the Federal Highway Administration has let a tentative contract award on the Willow Creek Highway project.

Poe Asphalt from Clarkston, Washington was the apparent low bidder on Phase I of the Willow Creek project beginning at the North Fork of Willow Creek, better known as the Blake addition turnoff.

If Poe Asphalt stands the qualification test for low bidder, fencing of the project will begin on September 15 and sub-contractor Steelman and Duff also of Clarkston will begin actual road construction approximately October 15.

The low bid of \$2,173,541.47 constitutes one of the largest bids let in Morrow County. An additional bid of approximately the same magnitude will follow next fiscal year for Phase II which will complete the lower end of the Willow Creek project to the Corps of Engineer Dam above Heppner.

Earl Skow, spokesman for Poe Asphalt said that 8 subcontractors will be used during the course of the project and as many local people will be used as possible.

Work is expected to begin as near October 15 as possible and will continue through the winter, weather permitting.

Eastern Oregon showcased at Governor's Conference

Eastern Oregon Tourism will be spotlighted at the 1989 Oregon Governor's Conference on Tourism to be held in March of 1989 at Pendleton. The annual Governor's Conference brings city and county tourism representatives together with tour operators and tourism industry leaders for three days of seminars, workshops, and a speech from Governor Goldschmidt. 1989 will be the first opportunity for Eastern Oregon to showcase the attractions awaiting visitors to our communities. Entertainment, luncheon hosts, and tourism displays are among the early plans for the up coming conference. Highlighting the final day's activities will be a ten minute multi-media six-projector dissolve slide show showcasing Eastern Oregon. An original music track composed by John McKennon Music Director at Eastern Oregon State College and performed by local

musicians will be featured. Eastern Oregon photographers, both amateur and professional, are being asked to submit 35 mm color slides of Eastern Oregon for use in the presentation. The slides submitted should emphasize the rich cultural heritage, the warm friendliness of the people, the activities available to visitors, the scenery, historical sites, geology, and natural history of Eastern Oregon. A secondary benefit from the multi-media slide show will be the conversion of the presentation to a video format that will be available for cities and counties to use as a travel video to promote tourism in their area.
