

Investigation yields over two pounds of cocaine

A joint investigation by the Morrow County Sheriff's office, Oregon State Police-Umatilla and the Tri-Cities Metro Drug Task Force resulted in the arrest of two Mexican males and the seizure of approximately 2.2 pounds of Cocaine. The Cocaine has an estimated street value of \$40,000.

Ignacio Hernandez, 22, of 1715 N. 10th Pasco, and Jaime Gonzales, 18 of 118 S. Almira Connell, were arrested by Oregon State Police and Morrow County Sheriff's deputies just east of Irrigon at approximately 7:40 p.m. n Sept. 7, 1988 after selling the Cocaine to undercover officers.

Hernandez and Gonzales were lodged in Benton County Washington. Hernandez is charged with three counts of Possession of a Controlled Substance, three counts of Delivery of a Controlled Substance for a total bail of \$120,000. Gonzales is charged with two counts of Possession of a Controlled Substance and two counts of Delivery of a Controlled Substance with bail set at a total of \$80,000. The investigation is continuing and further arrests are expected.

\$44,000 tax levy again on Irrigon ballot

The Irrigon City Council has voted to retain the Chief of Police, one officer, city recorder and secretary until after the November 8 election.

The failure of the Irrigon residents to approve a \$44,000 tax levy, August 9, has put one or more of those positions in jeopardy. The residents will again have a chance to pass the levy November 8. If the tax levy fails again, the city has the option of calling a special

emergency levy election within thirty-four days. Also on the ballot will be a request to raise the 1980 \$30,000 tax base to \$75,000. If passed, the new base would go into effect July 1989.

Irrigon receives rescue unit

The long awaited Basic Life Support Rescue Unit has arrived in Irrigon. The Chevrolet Suburban rescue unit, with a 454 cubic-inch engine, was assigned to the Irrigon Rural Fire Department recently by the Morrow County Medical Board through an inter-governmental agreement. The Basic Life Support Vehicle will be used to provide emergency medical assistance until the Umatilla ambulance arrive. The fifteen to twenty minute time span between the time the 911 call is placed and when the ambulance is able to arrive on the scene in Irrigon can be critical, according to Irrigon Police Chief Steve Mackey. The Irrigon Fire District will administer the program; supply the Emergency Medical Technicians (EMT), the training, and the record

keeping. The rescue vehicle is equipped with an oxygen unit, suction unit, back boards, litters and other basic life support equipment with which to enable the Irrigon Rapid Response group to assist in an emergency until the ambulance arrives. The certified Irrigon EMTs in the Rapid Response group are Dick Foidel, Burrell Cooley, Judy Creighton, Sandra Dooney, Harry Gilpin and Chief Steve Mackey. The unit will respond to any fire with the fire department and every accident. "We've had thirty calls already," said Mackey. The current fire station will be expanded to house the new vehicle, according to Orville Buchanan, Chairman of the Irrigon Rural Fire District Board of Directors. The rescue unit is temporary until such time a new rescue unit can be purchased for the City of Irrigon.

Imitation fish look alike

If you've spent any time in the frozen fish section of your supermarket lately, you've probably encountered more and more varieties of shellfish substitutes--imitation crab, shrimp, scallops and lobsters that look just like the real thing. Priced a half to a third less than their real counterparts imitation shellfish are a nutritious and economical way to include lowfat, high protein fish in your diet.

most seafood is significantly lower in dietary fat than red meat. However, keep in mind that salt is added during processing of imitation seafood, so sodium content can be much higher than that of unsalted fresh seafood. Since imitation shellfish are fully cooked, you can simply thaw and serve them cold. If you include them in a hot dish, add toward the end of the cooking time, just to heat through, overcooking can make them tough.

The look-alike shellfish are made from Pacific whitefish, mostly pollock, that has been washed repeatedly to remove any color and odor. It is then processed into products that have the taste, texture, shapes and natural colors of a variety of shellfish. After steaming, the shellfish substitutes are frozen and packaged for the market.

Imitation shellfish are nutritionally comparable to whitefish rather than shellfish. They provide a variety of essential minerals, yet are much lower in cholesterol than some real shellfish, such as shrimp and lobster. Seafood can play an important role in helping meet the Dietary Guidelines to Lower Cancer Risk recommended by the American Institute for Cancer Research, since
