Fall term, Pathophysiology (Nur 352) will be offered in Pendleton on Wednesday afternoons starting Sept 28. Instructor for the class will be Pat Smart, BMCC instructor of nursing. Class will meet from noon to 3 p.m. Tuition is \$255.

The course will be an analysis of selected nursing care problems relating to health and illness over the life cycle. Specific topics to be covered include differentiating between the normal and abnormal components of the healing process and analyzing the nursing measures that promote the normal healing process.
