Friday, September 16 the Ione Cardinal football team hosted the Cascade Locks Pirates in league play. The Cardinals lost their second conference game 44-46.

The Cards started slow allowing the Pirates to score first but Dustin Padberg ran 18 yards to tie the two teams at 6-6 in the first quarter.

In second quarter play, Cascade Locks attacked the Cardinal defense scoring twice as the Cardinals' quarterback Sean Warren forced his

way through to the goal line to end the score at half-time at 12-20.

As the Pirates opened the third quarter with a kick-off, Sean Warren, replacing Brian Ball, who was injured late in the first quarter, ran the ball 64 yards for a touch-down. That led the Cardinal attack on the unsuspecting Pirates. During the third quarter, Sean Warren had a 33 yard quarterback sneak which set up a Padberg 12 yard touch-down.

Padberg returned the favor by running the ball 32 yards. Setting up Warren for a 4 yard touch-down. Cascade Locks returned with only

one touch-down.

The fourth quarter proved to be the most exciting with the Cardinals trying to get ahead of the game. Rob Wilson set the spirits on a high as he intercepted a pass from the Cascade Locks quarterback and ran it back 40 yards allowing the final Cardinal touchdown by Dustin Padberg for 3 yards.

Braed Papineau had two quarterback sacks and Brian Doherty led the Cardinal tackles with 18 but Cascade Locks held onto the ball long enough to end the game at 44-46.

Hermiston had trouble picking up the first few serves and fell behind 5-1. They then scored 11 straight points to lead 12-5. Hermiston upped the score to 14-8 and Heppner held them for awhile, but the Bulldogs went on to win 15-10.

All of the Fillies played well, with setters Christy Stroeber and Nikki Brisbois setting exceptionally well in pressure situations. Sandi Turner also played a very fine net game, hitting and blocking well.

The Fillies played Grant Union Thursday and Stanfield on Tuesday and finally open Columbia Basin Conference play at Wahtonka on September 22.

Ione Garden Club discusses growing of iris

"Growing Iris-Bearded and Beardless" was the topic for discussion at the Ione Garden Club meeting on Wednesday September 14. Virginia Peck was hostess with Pat Pettyjohn assisting. Helen Martin leader, pointed out that the most common iris used in this area are the bearded ones which are usually classified according to height (from 8" to 3-4" tall). The beardless types may be roots or bulbous types. Those grown from roots are the Psuedaeris (water iris), Spuria, Siberian, Japanese, Evansia, Louisiana, and Pacific Coast. Those known as bulbous (commercial or florist) are reticulata, Dutch (includes the English and Spanish) and others. Iris are especially suitable for our area because they do well in alkaline soil and full sun and do not need excessive watering. They produce better if top dressed with fertilizer in the spring and planted with bone meal. They may be divided after blooming about every 3 to 4 years.

A Mini Flower Show was held with each member bringing the best in her garden for exhibit. Points in showing and judging were discussed for individual flowers. There

were over fifty horticulture exhibits and 3 arrangements.

During the business meeting, plans were made to attend the Blue Mountain District - 10 meeting in Pendleton on October 3. Pat Pettyjohn is preparing a book of evidence for our observance of Oregon Garden Week held in the first week of June.
