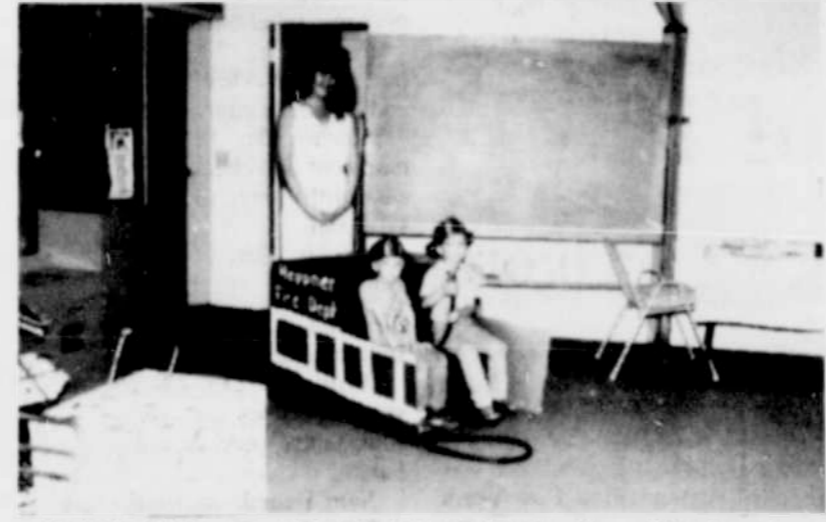

More than 600 were in attendance at the 75th annual Oregon Cattlemen's Association meeting held in Baker, September 22-25.

State Association President Bill Wolfe, Wallowa, first vice president Don Gomes, Antelope and OCA treasurer Robert Jones, Hillsboro, were re-elected for another year.

Newly elected District vice president included Mark Rietman, Heppner. The Association will hold the 1989 convention in Portland next November.

Bob Reboltz, newly elected chairman of the National Beef Industry Council, informed the Cattlemen of newly developed national advertising programs for television, radio and the print media. He said that the beef industry would continue with its theme, "Real Food for Real People." 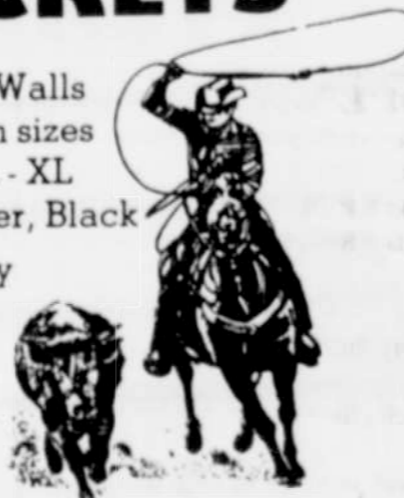

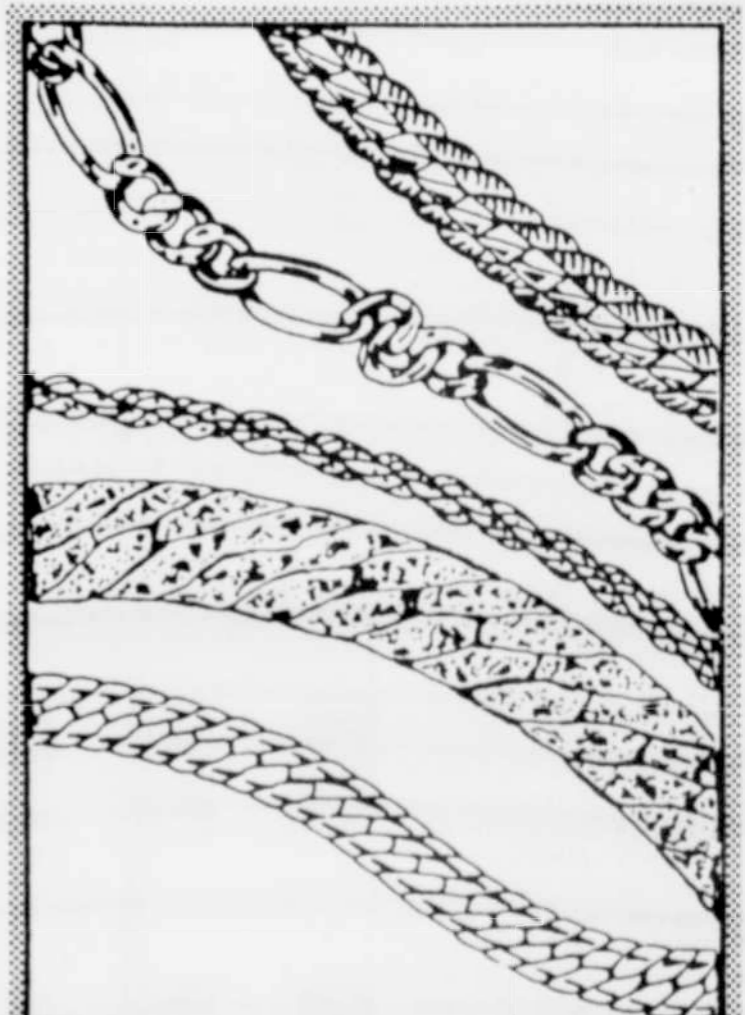
