Mrs. Frederickson grew up in the Heppner-Lexington area, and continued her education at the University of Oregon, where she received a Bachelor of Arts degree in special education, and a Master of Science degree in counseling from Oregon State University.

Her first teaching job was at Eugene Junior High where she worked with Handicapped kids, then she moved back "home" to Heppner and taught English at the Junior High for four years. Before teaching

at Columbia Junior High, where she has taught for the last seven years, she taught English in Umatilla for one year.

She's been involved in such activities as Leadership Conferences, Community Awareness Programs, workshops on subjects such as drug and alcohol abuse, talented and gifted programs and she recently traveled to St. Louis University to do a communication workshop. She is on the Board of Directors for the SAIC organization which is a non-profit organization that sponsors communication workshops through Oregon State University.

Mrs. Frederickson has also been involved in the Student Senate program for about fourteen years. She had coached track for the past eight years, but will be unable to do so this year with her new title as principal.

"But I'll be at all their track meets," she adds, to cheer them on.

She would like to create a more relaxed atmosphere at Columbia Junior High this year and establish a good relationship between the school and the community. The only changes she has planned so far this year is the new "Help Study" program, which will help the students who get behind in their classwork catch up. She feels the students and teachers should both receive more recognition for their achievements and hopes to recognize them this year.

Mrs. Frederickson and her husband Vernon reside as ranchers in the Irrigon area.

Columbia Junior High should have a wonderful year ahead of them, with Mrs. Frederickson behind the student and faculty all the way.

Two Boardman men plead guilty recently to Arson charges arising from the April 12 fire which destroyed the Hitching Post Restaurant in Boardman, according to Morrow County District Attorney Jeff Wallace.

Jay Hamilton, 66, plead guilty to

First Degree Arson before Circuit Court Judge Pro-Tem Ralph Currin on September 26, 1988. Judge Currin ordered a pre-sentence investigation and sentencing was set for November 18, 1988.

Bobby Hamilton, 19, plead guilty to Attempted Arson in the First

Degree before Judge Jack Olsen on September 7, 1988. A pre-sentence investigation was also ordered and sentencing was set for October 6, 1988. Boardman police and fire departments and the Oregon State Police Arson Unit cooperated in the investigation.

## School Board approves contracts

In a meeting held September 19 at Heppner High School, the Morrow County School board approved the resignation of Doug Akeson from his position as bus driver; hired Bennie Houk as elementary counselor for A.C. Houghton and Sam Boardman Elementary schools; hired Lynda Perkins as half-time cook for the Irrigon schools; hired Lydia Sanchez as a temporary special education aide at A.C. Houghton; hired Brenda Newport as bus driver in Irrigon; hired Cindy Brosnan as shuttle bus driver in Heppner; hired Vicky Correa as cook at Heppner Elementary and approved the position descriptions for head secretary and secretary at the district office.

The board heard a request from Maureen McElligott, president of the Morrow County Education Association for continued efforts to settle the certificated contract negotiations; heard a report from Chuck Starr on the development and implementation of a curriculum on AIDS-HIV communicable diseases for the Morrow County School District. They heard that O.E.A. Choice insurance rates are scheduled to increase in the medical and

dental coverage areas; the maintenance projects on roofs are either complete or nearly complete at all schools. The new gym floor at Lone Elementary has been installed but still needs to be sanded, sealed and lines painted; heard the district enrollment as of September 15 was 1,773 students.

Under unfinished business the board appointed Bruce Nicholes to the Budget Committee for a three year term.

Under new business the board approved the hiring of Lynda Frederickson as acting principal at Columbia Junior High; hired Kevin Pratt as counselor at Columbia replacing Lynda Frederickson; approved emergency exception to the provisions of an approved unpaid leave for Carol Justus; approved several extended responsibility contracts for coaches and advisory positions in the district and read a letter from Betty Carlson, Morrow County OSEA secretary proposing a change in health/medical insurance.

The next regular meeting will be October 17 at the District Office in Lexington.

## Folksinger Staines appearing in Irrigon

for his toe tapping folk songs and unique yodeling ability, has put Irrigon on his touring circuit.

Students and guests will be in for a treat Wednesday, October 12 at 3:30 p.m. as Staines spins his tales in song at A.C. Houghton Elementary. Tickets are \$3 for adults and \$2 for students and may be purchased at the door.

For fifteen years, Bill, a native of New England, has traveled across North America giving concerts and captivating audiences with his heart felt melodies.

Most of the songs he sings are his own, but he does insert others now and again.

Entertaining standing room only crowds, Bill Staines wanders the entire country writing and singing about every state, including Alaska.

He has a warm, rich baritone voice, which he periodically switches into a yodeling "mode". Staines was the winner of a 1975 National Yodeling Championship, at the

Kerrville Folk Festival in Kerrville, Texas.

He has been heard frequently on Minnesota Public Radio's "A Prairie Home Companion" and was included on their First Five Years anniversary album. A reviewer for The Phoenix stated he was "simply Boston's best performer." The annual reader's poll of the Boston Globe selected him as a favorite folk performer.

The Austin American-Statesman says, "as he sings he can put memories in your traveling bag and miles upon your shoes without either you or your possessions ever physically leaving the room."

Staines says of his style, "I guess you'd have to say it's country-folk without being country-western."

An example of his songs are "A Place in the Choir", "All God's Critters", "The Roseville Fair", "Sweet Wyoming Home", and "The Ballad of Jake and Ten-Ton Molly."

## Permits issued for special controlled deer and elk hunts

One of the largest research enclosures ever built to study big game will be the site for special controlled hunts of deer and elk this fall.

Permits have been issued by the Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife (ODF&W) to 125 deer hunters and 200 elk hunters for the new 25,000-acre fenced enclosure on the USDA Starkey Experimental Forest and Range, 28 miles southwest of La Grande on the Wallawa-Whitman National Forest.

Deer hunting begins October 1 and runs through October 12. The first of two elk hunts takes place October 26-30; the second hunt is slated for November 5-13.

The hunts are part of a 10-year, 4-million dollar research effort by the USDA Forest Service and

ODF&W to study the effects of intensively managed forests of the future on the populations of deer and elk. Results from the studies are expected to guide future management decisions involving hundreds of millions of dollars.

Hunting will be a key activity on intensively managed forests of the future. Because of this, deer and elk hunting is part of the research, and special rules apply.

"During the hunts, anyone entering and leaving the enclosure must check-in and out at the check station at the main gate off Highway 244," said Donavin Leckenby, Project Leader for the Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife. "No hunting is allowed within 1/4 mile of either side of the 8-foot high game fence. Boundaries of the closed area along the fence are clearly posted with orange signs, and marked on maps we have provided to the hunters."

Leckenby added, "only hunters with valid permits issued for the area will be allowed to hunt, and hunting is restricted to deer or elk only. No other forms of hunting, such as for grouse or bear, are allowed within the enclosure."

Hunters may camp within the enclosure and campfires are allowed. Vehicle travel, however, is

restricted to specific roads and areas, as posted at the main gate.

To help answer questions and provide guidance to hunters, the check station will remain open 24 hours a day during the hunts, including two days before and one day after each hunt period.
