

Sheriff's Report

The Morrow County Sheriff's office at the courthouse in Heppner reports dispatching the following business during the past week:

The Heppner Mustangs broke loose Friday night, Sept. 30, as the Mustangs hosted the Wasco County Redskins and won 34 to 8.

In the first quarter Dick Devin hit wide receiver Craig Angell for a 36 yard touchdown pass. Later in the first quarter the Mustangs found the end zone again as Russell Britt ran in from two yards out. In the second quarter the Mustangs worked

downfield to score again on a two yard run by Britt. At halftime the Mustangs were ahead 21-0, but didn't stop there.

In the third quarter Devin found Angell again on a five yard touchdown pass. In the fourth quarter Devin passed the ball again. This time to senior Mike Correa for a 23 yard touchdown.

Wasco County had their only score late in the fourth quarter.

Britt led the rushing attack for the Mustangs with 18 carries for 159 yards, followed by Brian Kollman with six carries for 18 yards. In the air Angell had three catches for 91 yards and Correa had one catch for 23 yards.

"The offensive line was the key to the win," says coach Tim Birkby. The line did a super job of making holes for the running backs and gave the quarterback time to throw the ball. "Defensively we played a total team game," says Birkby. "Everybody did what they were supposed to do."

The Heppner Mustangs are 2-0 in league play and tied for first with Stanfield. The Mustangs take on the Stanfield Tigers Friday in Stanfield at 7:30 p. m. to decide who will lead the CBC League.
