Lady Cards defeat Dufur

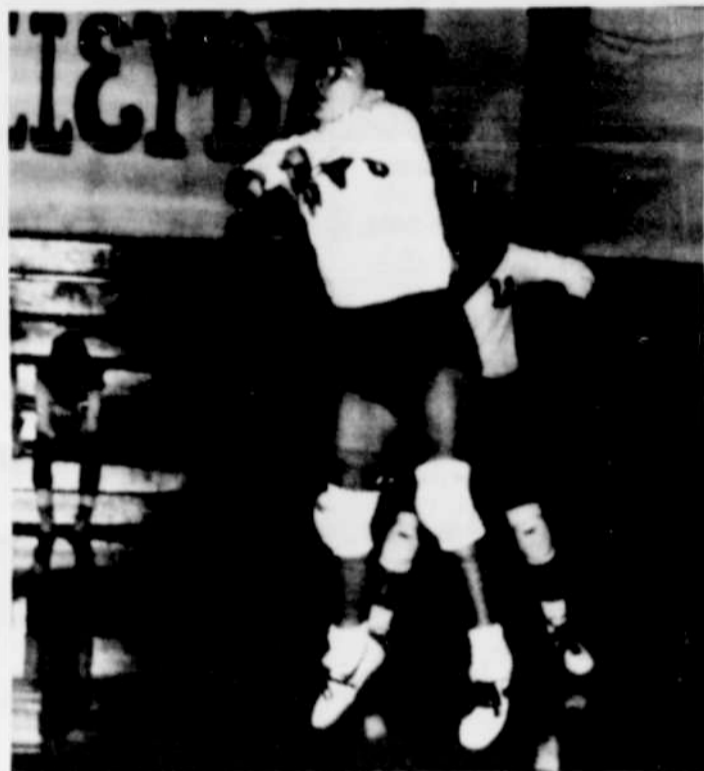

The Cardinals played a strong first quarter with Brian Ball intercepting a Dufur pass and returning it 29 yards for a touchdown. The next Ione possession proved to be another scoring run for Ball, this time for a 52 yard touchdown.

Rob Wilson, a strong defensive player, intercepted a Ranger pass setting up the Cardinals for yet another first quarter score. Ione ran a quarter-back sneak on the flustered Ranger team as Sean Warren ran for the 24 yard score.

The Ranger quarterback seemed to be a bit careless as he threw another intercepted pass, this time caught by Dustin Padberg. As the first quarter came to a close the score was 24-0.

Dufur opened its offense throwing still another intercepted pass to Dustin Padberg. Dufur, a bit shook up, regained possession only to fumble and have it recovered by Bryan Basford for the Cardinals.

Ione scored again with a six yard run by Padberg ending the score at

halftime, 30-0.

Dufur came back in the second half ready to play. The Rangers scored first in the third quarter. Brian Ball blocked the extra point kick attempt.

Padberg answered their scoring twice with a 6 yard touchdown run and a 41 yard touchdown run.

Freshman Travis Greenup ran 16 yards on two carries for the Cardinals proving a total team effort in defeating the Ranger team. Third quarter scoring ended at 44-6.

Dufur opened the fourth quarter showing a spark of integrity and an attempt to regain support by scoring a touchdown early. Junior Jim Davison blocked the Ranger's extra point attempt.

Ione playing a complete offensive and defensive game, returned to make their seventh and final touchdown by senior Dustin Padberg for six yards.

Dufur, determined to score one last time, scored and made their extra point kick good as the game came to a close with a score of Ione 50, Dufur 19.
