Seminar on farm programs to be held

Wheat growers need to know what a "person" is because that definition is very important for participation in Federal farm programs, according to Tom McCoy, Wasco farmer and chairman of the Farm Programs committee of the Oregon Wheat Growers League.

The OWGL is holding several seminars across Oregon to help wheat farmers.

"The 'person' definition is especially important for participation in the 1989 farm program," stated McCoy, "because all farmers who participate in the program, regardless of size, must give the USDA Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) information on how their farm business is organized."

"That information," warns McCoy, "will be used to determine who is a 'person' for payment limitation purposes in the farm program. And we don't know how far in the future this information may be used," cautioned McCoy.

Larry Rew, Pendleton attorney and farmer, will be a presenter on the seminar and will give some planning tips and knowledge that farmers should have in advance of the program sign-up. Giving the technical aspects of the "person" definition regarding participation in the 1989 farm program will be Glen Stonebrink, Portland, State Executive Director of ASCS, and Roger Tresham, Portland, State Program Specialist.

Seminars will be held: October 20-Pendleton Red Lion/Indian Hills, 9 a.m. to 12 noon; October 27-The Dalles, Excelsior Inn, 9 a.m. to 12 noon; October 27-Salem, Chumaree Inn, 3 to 6 p.m.

"It is very important for all farmers who plan to participate in the 1989 USDA-ASCS farm program to be knowledgeable about this 'person' definition," reminded McCoy. "I heartily encourage all interested farmers to attend."

McCoy said there is no charge for the seminars.

Ione Topic club receives special treat

"Wines, Types and Uses" was the subject presented by Pat McElligott, son of Don and Eunice McElligott at the September 28 meeting of the Ione Topic Club. Pat is a wine retailer for Amity Vineyards of Sheridan. He brought six Riesling wines for the group to taste noting the difference in alcoholic and sugar content. He presented some interesting points such as "fortified" wine is over 18 percent sugar, if wine has a sulphur dioxide (rotten egg) odor it is a "bad" bottle; all wines "age" in the unopened bottle; a wine should be used within

three days of opening for the best flavor; Oregon and California have the strictest labeling laws in the U.S. requiring that 90 percent of the grapes be of the type indicated on the label and "table" wine is made from grapes from more than one area. He noted that if red wine was spilled on the cloth, white wine poured on it will remove the stain. Also salted boiling water will remove it.

Film workshop scheduled

Residents of Eastern Oregon will be given a unique opportunity to become involved with the film industry. A 2½ day workshop on film location scouting is one of six being offered throughout the state by the Oregon Film and Video Division.

The workshop is designed to give both classroom and hands on experience, beginning Friday afternoon, October 21 and ending Sunday morning October 23. The course will include nuts and bolts instruc-

tion from what to look for in potential locations for film, to how to present your photographic information and materials to the film director.

Nelson says French campaign misleads on issues

State Representative candidate Mike Nelson said his opponent Ray French's decision to launch a negative campaign is "very unfortunate for the voters" but was brought on by polls that show French losing the race.

"I don't like negative campaigning, and I won't participate. We owe the voters a clear, open and honest discussion of the issues. I'm disappointed that Mr. French has chosen instead to lie about my stand on spending and tax issues. Those who have heard me speak, or read about me know Mr. French's statements are untrue," Nelson said.

Nelson said a poll taken September 21 through September 30 by First Opinion, a polling firm in Salem, Oregon, showed Nelson leading French 55 percent to 37 percent with 8 percent undecided. The poll surveyed 235 registered voters in all four counties.

In a campaign piece mailed this week, French said Nelson wants to repeal the spending limit, will vote to break the limit, and increase taxes.
