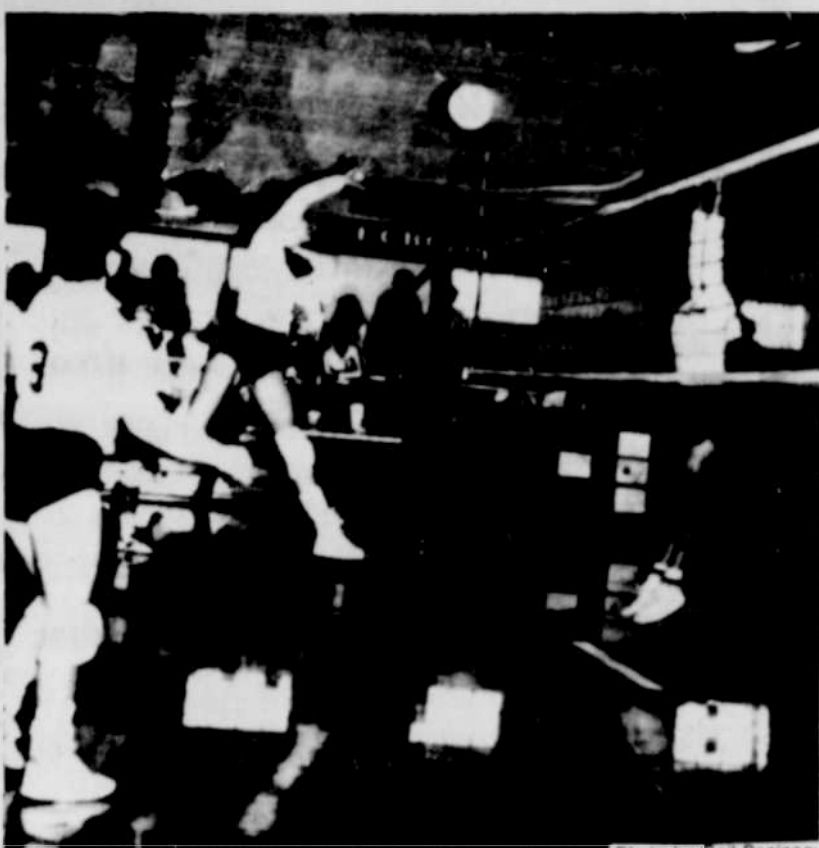


Lady cards now 7-0

The second quarter opened positively for the Cardinals as Brian Doherty recovered a Cougar fumble. The Cards failed to score on their drive. Echo finished the first half beating the Cardinal defense to score three times in the second quarter en-

ding the scoring in the first half at Echo 38, Ione 6.

Third quarter opened and the Cardinals were missing Dustin Padberg due to a knee injury in the second quarter.

Again the Cards opened with an interception to the Cougars. Echo found the holes in Ione's defense and used it to score once again.

The Cardinals, a bit disturbed about the course the game was taking, decided to run the ball. The Cards fumbled the ball only to have the ball recovered by Echo for the final play of the game. A '45 point rule' ends the game after halftime if one team is getting beat by 45 points or more. The final score was Echo 52, Ione 6.

Mustangs beat Stanfield -lead in CBC play

The Heppner Mustangs took on the Stanfield Tigers Friday night and won 14-0. Both teams were undefeated until they met Friday on the Tigers home turf.

The Mustangs took an early 7 point lead when senior quarterback Dick Devin met wide receiver Craig Angell on a 36 yard touchdown pass.

Late in the second quarter, Ama of the Stanfield Tigers fumbled the ball while Russell Britt recovered for the Mustangs and ran a 35 yard touchdown.

"The Mustangs played well the first half," said coach Birkby, "we kept control of the ball and had good field position most of the time." Defensively, the Mustangs played strong only giving the Tigers 80 total yards, while offensively the Mustangs racked up 232 yards.

In the second half, Stanfield's kicking game kept the Mustangs in a hole, but they held tough never letting the Tigers score.

Russell Britt led the offensive attack for the Mustangs racking up 117 yards on 19 carries, while Jim Brosnan had 41 yards on seven carries. Craig Angell had four catches for 56 yards.

Defensively Dick Devin had four interceptions and eight assisted tackles with one unassisted tackle leading the Mustangs with 25 defensive points followed by Jesse Jefferys who had one fumble recovery, two unassisted tackles and 15 assisted tackles for a total of 23

points.

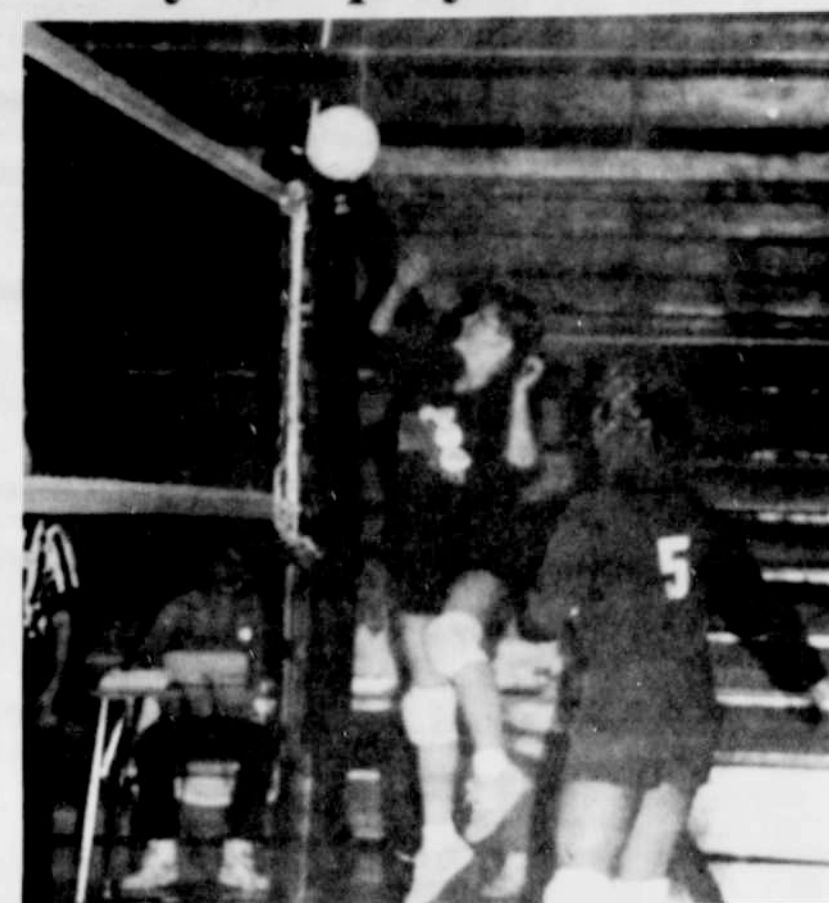
