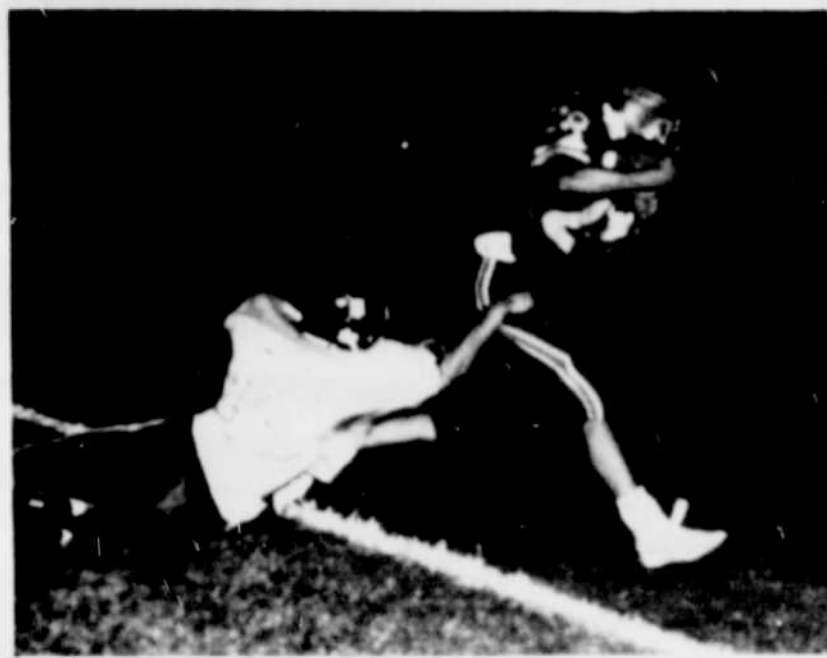


Mustangs suffer first league loss

The Heppner Mustangs suffered their first loss in Columbia Basin Conference league play to the Riverside Pirates Thursday night. "The Mustangs just couldn't dominate on the line," said coach Birky, "defensively we held our own through the first half, but they just wore us down in the second half." Offensively the Mustangs could not get their running game started. Jim Brosnan lead the rushing attack with 1 for 9 yards and Brian

Kollman with 1 for 6 yards followed by Russell Britt with 12 for 16 yards. The Mustangs played well in the second quarter as Devin met senior Craig Angell on 21 yard and 10 yard touchdown passes to take the lead at the half 14-10, but the Mustangs let the Pirates take control of the second half scoring two touchdowns in the third quarter to secure their win 24-14.

The Mustangs gained 94 of their 167 total yards passing in the second quarter. Craig Angell lead the receiving with seven catches for 91 yards followed by Bryan Padberg with one catch for 35 yards and Mike Correa who had one catch for 21 yards.

Defensively the Mustangs played well, but just couldn't stop the power running of Riverside. The defense gave up a total of 325 yards which is the most yards that the team has given up this year. Jesse Jeffries was outstanding for the Mustangs scoring 31 defensive points including two quarterback sacks, and 14 defensive points.

This loss for the Mustangs drops them to a three-way tie for first place with Stanfield and Umatilla. The Mustangs travel to Umatilla Friday to take on the Vikings at 2:30 p.m.

Britt - Devin earn CBC honors Players of the week

Dick Devin a senior at Heppner High School earned defensive Columbia Conference player of the week at Fridays game October 7, against the Stanfield Tigers. Devin caught four interceptions running them back for 57 yards, eight assisted tackles, and one unassisted tackle. Devin starts at free safety on defense and quarterback on offense. Devin also threw for 69 yards against the Tigers and one for a touchdown.

Dick Devin is currently eighth in defensive tackles with 45 points and leads the league in interceptions with six, an average of two per game. Devin also leads the league in passing with 351 yards and six touchdowns. Devin is the second player that the Mustangs have had on CBC player of the week. Junior Russell Britt was offensive CBC player of the week against Wasco County. Britt had 18 carries for 159 yards against the Redsides.

Russell Britt a junior at Heppner High School was picked CBC player of the week because of his outstanding performance Friday, September 30 against Wasco County Redsides. Britt carried the ball 18 times and got a total of 159 yards. That is an average of 8.8 yards per carry.

Britt also had two touchdowns against the Redsides. In the previous games the Mustangs have had, Britt gained 56 yards against Weston-McEwen, 52 yards against Riverside and 57 yards against Grant Union.

Throughout the season, Britt has averaged 47 yards per carry and has a total of 324 yards. Britt broke loose against Wasco County and picked up over 100 yards more than his average. Britt scored another touchdown and had another 117 yards in his next game against the Stanfield Tigers.

County Agent's Corner

Reports recently that contact lens wearers could suffer eye damage or blindness from exposure to an electrical or welding arc are false, according to Fred Lundin, Morrow County Extension Agent.

Last April the Office of Environmental Health and Safety reported two incidents of individuals who supposedly had a contact lens fused to the cornea of their eye after being exposed to an electrical or welding arc. "They have found that these accidents did not occur," said Lundin.

The U.S. Health Department and the Occupational Health and Safety Administration (OSHA) declared these stories as false and without any factual basis. They feel that while ultraviolet light produced by the arc could result in cornea burns and ulcerations in the unprotected eye, they would not be sufficient to cause more serious damage. Some stories blame microwaves (from the welding arc) for eye damage, but these stories are also without basis in fact.

OSHA emphasized the need to wear protective glasses or goggles when working with welding equipment, however. Contact lenses provided no protection in contact with chemical fumes, vapor, heat, hot metals, or particulate atmosphere.

If your water bill is paid by another party you may pick up a pass at City Hall. Users with no card or pass will be considered outside users.

The City Council agreed that the way to identify a flatbed truck will be anything with dual wheels on the back. A trailer behind a car or pickup is considered a truck and will be charged the truck rate.

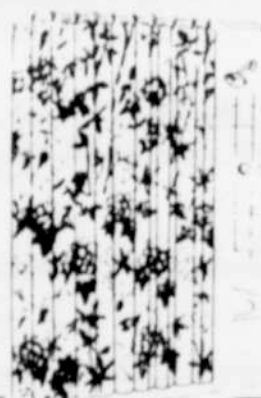
