The Ione Cardinals took on the undefeated Sherman County Huskies in football action Thursday, October 13.

The Huskies opened strong scoring within the first 30 seconds of the game. Ione came back to score on a 25 yard pass run from Sean Warren to Dustin Padberg. Sherman scored late in the first quarter making the score Ione 8, Sherman County 16.

Second quarter scoring was completely dominated by the Huskies. They scored three times to end the score at half time Ione 8, Sherman County 40.

Ione came back strong in the third quarter with junior Rob Wilson returning the Husky kickoff 80 yards for a Cardinal touchdown.

Both defenses played strong as possession changed hands three consecutive times. Ione's Mike McBride

Ione finished the game scoring one last time on a 49 yard pass run from Warren to senior Brian Bal, ending the final score at Ione 40, Sherman County 60.
