Cardinals defeats Wheeler 28 - 20

The Lone Cardinals met the Wheeler Falcons Saturday, October 22, in league play in football.

Lone opened strong to prove they weren't a team to trifle with as Sean

Warren threw a pass to Dustin Padberg for a 55 yard pass run for a touchdown.

Lone's defense played tough as they faced the Falcons to punt on their possession. Lone then fumbled

causing the Falcons to score on a drive from their offense.

As Wheeler gained the ball again, the Cardinal defense forced major yard loss for the Falcons. Lone regained the ball on the two yard line

as a result of a poor snap on Wheeler's punt attempt. Sean Warren ran the two yards for the Cardinal touchdown ending the first quarter with a score of Lone 14, Wheeler 6.

The Cardinal defense never let up despite penalties. Bryan Basford recovered a Falcon fumble allowing lone to score again on a Warren pass to Bryan Ball for 48 yards.

Penalties dominated the game as Wheeler lost 75 yards and Lone lost 105. Wheeler took advantage of the penalty situation and scored on the next possession. The score at the end of half time was Lone 20, Wheeler 12.

Defense dominated the third quarter as neither team scored. Lone had a total of 121 tackles for the entire game.

Lone was the first to score in the fourth quarter. Warren, who had a total of 204 yards passing, threw a 38 yard pass run for a touchdown to Padberg. Padberg ended the game with 145 pass running and 141 yards rushing. Warren was 6 in 9 pass completions and had no interceptions.

Wheeler scored one last time with six seconds left in the game. The final score was Lone 28, Wheeler 20.

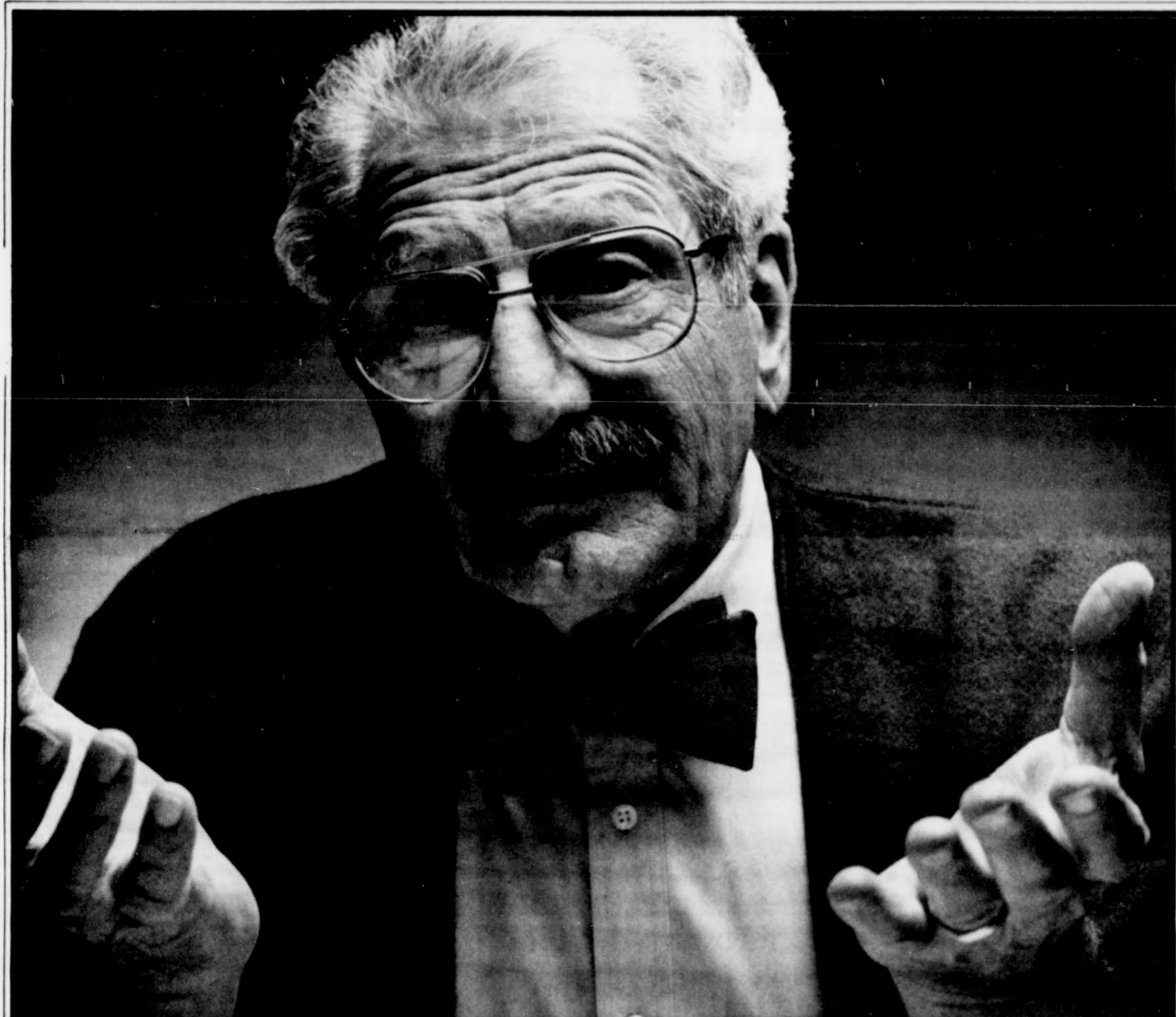
