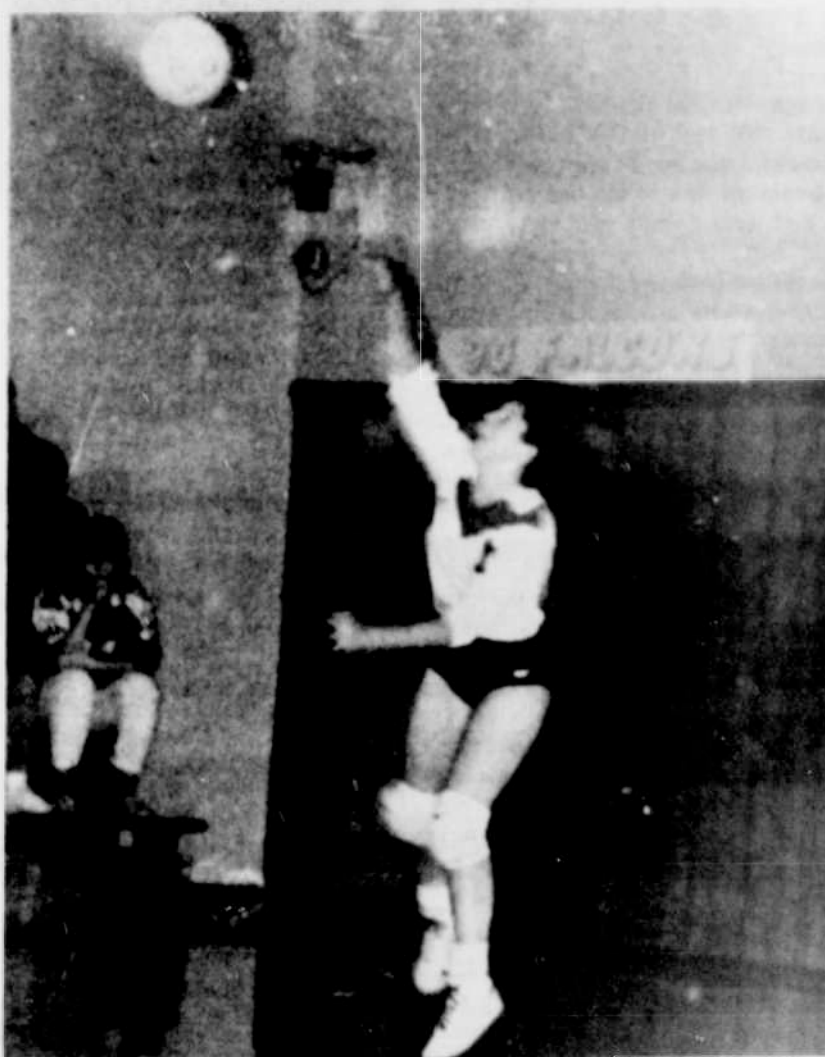

A new man in District 59

Baker businessman Mike Nelson says voters should elect him state representative in District 59 because the man who holds the seat, Ray French, simply is not a player in the Oregon Legislature.

We think Nelson is right.

French seems to be a good, honest, man, and the former cattleman has done his best to represent constituents in the rural district that includes Crook, Baker, Grant and Morrow counties.

But in two terms he has not shown an ability to be a force in the Legislature on any subject, including the agriculture and water issues most important to the people he represents.

Nelson, meanwhile, has emerged as a leader in economic development

projects in his community. The real estate broker also was a member of Gov. Neil Goldschmidt's 17-member transition team in late 1986 and he has served as vice-chairman of the Oregon Tourism Council.

Nelson says if he is elected he will seek to "promote the land and what it yields," whether it is agriculture crops, timber, minerals or recreation opportunities.

That sounds like a man who understands the difficulty of representing a region that must protect its traditional natural resource industries while accommodating a growing number of tourists.

We think he is the right man to represent District 59 in the Oregon House of Representatives.

Washington, in which the focus on Oregon rivers often seemed lost. If Congressman Bob Smith had had the help of even one of Oregon's delegation, he could have saved Oregon's rivers from nationalization and preserved the private landowners right near those rivers because the rest of Congress was beginning to understand what was at risk for their own states in the Wild and Scenic Rivers Act.

We thought Congress understood that a balanced budget was critical to American's economy and that "planning" and "managing" Oregon's rivers would be as costly as it is unnecessary. We thought all of Oregon's delegation understood that the designation itself of "Wild and Scenic" on a river attracts national attention to it and actually causes debasement from other use.

Oregonians now know that Congressman Peter DeFazio orchestrated the blocking of amendments to the bill that were vital to the protection of private landowner rights in the river systems; but we do not know why.

Hopefully, all Oregonians will look at this most recent example of misguided use of power as beneath the dignity of those we choose to represent us in Washington, D.C., and elect people like Congressman Bob Smith, who cares about Oregon and Oregonians.

History will bear out that the position he took on the Wild and Scenic Rivers bill was the correct one, that nationalizing our rivers does not mean their protection is guaranteed, but that their control is lost; and that the loss of private landowner rights inherent in the act damages the cause of free people everywhere.

We will return Bob Smith to Congress. Would that we could send four more exactly like him.
