

## Mustangs host Pine Eagle in playoff game

Heppner High School will host the Pine-Eagle Spartans in the opening round of the OSAA-U.S. Bank Class A football championship playoff. Game time is set for 7:30 p.m. Friday, November 11 at the Morrow County fairgrounds.

The Mustangs earned the Columbia Basin Conference championship with a 25-0 victory over Pilot Rock last Friday, November 5. Meanwhile, Pine-Eagle claimed the number two spot in the Wapiti League with a 17-12 win over Elgin.

The two schools are not strangers in football playoffs. This will mark the third time the schools have paired off in the championship round. The first meeting was in 1970 and then again in 1974. The schools met in Halfway with Pine-Eagle winning both contests.

Heppner comes into the Friday game with a 6-3 season record and 6-1 in CBC play. The Spartans are 6-2 for the season and ended in a tie

for second place with Enterprise in the Wapiti League at 4-2, but earned the playoff spot by beating the Savages, 14-7.

The winner of the Heppner-Pine-Eagle game will advance to the state quarter finals against the winner of the Neah-Kak-Nie-Willamina contest at a site and time to be announced.

Tickets are currently available for Friday night's contest at Heppner High School and are \$4 for adults and \$3 for students. No passes, including senior citizen passes, will be honored at this OSAA-U.S. Bank sponsored contest.

There will be a hospitality room available for Heppner and Pine-Eagle adult fans in the Pavilion building at the fairgrounds. Cookies and coffee and punch will be provided by the Heppner Booster Club.

Gates will open at 6 p.m. as will the hospitality room. All tickets are general admission.

ing for this game. The score of game two was Ione 15; Wheeler 5.

Wheeler went on to beat Arlington to advance to state as team number two. The state tournament will be held November 11 and 12 in Eugene at Lane Community College.

First games of the tournament will be at 3:30 p.m. Ione will play Christ's Center of Junction City at 5 p.m.

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## Fair awarded silver medallion

A Silver Medallion has been awarded to the Morrow County Fair by the County Fair Commission for the 1988 Fair Evaluation. 950 points are required for a Gold Medallion, which we received last year, and Morrow County received 935 points this year.

It is the statutory purpose of the County Fair Commission that it should evaluate each county fair, each year and assign to it merit points to reflect that year's success in staging a county fair and in maintaining its interim business. Through this evaluation system the County Fair Commission gives added assurance to the Legislature and the people of Oregon that the monies set aside for the County Fairs are being responsibly and appropriately spent.

"The Morrow County Fair is doing

all the basic things and may only need some financial support to boost their activities and replace the antiquated buildings," states CFC Appraiser Lynn Corwin. Mr. Corwin's report stated that the fair should be encouraged to keep trying for lottery funds to replace some buildings which are overcrowded, add new pipe or metal pens outside, work on better traffic patterns for both vehicles and people, and overhead mirrors for cooking demonstrations, and was impressed with our good involvement by schools, Chamber of Commerce, lumber companies and community groups. "The cooperation with the schools in sharing buses and facilities is fantastic," added Corwin. "I believe this fair is on the verge of breaking out to exciting times and great things."

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
