Mustangs are District 7-A champs

The Heppner Mustangs traveled to Pilot Rock to take the Rockets Friday night. The Mustangs were ready to play football when they came on to the field. Not even being Pilot Rock's homecoming could intimidate the Mustangs offense as they came out scoring early when Dick Devin met Bryan Padberg on an 18 yard touchdown pass in the first quarter.

In the second quarter the Mustangs set up another drive as they scored when Devin hit Russell Britt on a 16 yard pass to score late in the second quarter. Heppner was on a roll again as Devin met Padberg again on a 37 yard pass to score and make it 19-0 at the half.

In the third quarter the Mustangs slowed down a little, but came back to score one last time as senior fullback Jim Brosnan ran it in on a four yard run to make the score a final 25-0.

The Mustang defense was strong, only giving up 78 total yards. Britt had 16 defensive points while Steve Arbogast and Brian Kollman each had 12 defensive points. Arbogast led the Mustang defensive line with two quarterback sacks for a loss of 23 yards. Leading the running attack for the Mustangs was running back Russell Britt who had 89 yards on 15 carries followed by Brian Kollman and Jim Brosnan who had six carries for 20 yards each. Doug Devin had

4-19 passing; Dick Devin had six completions of 16 attempts for 139 yards. Receiving the ball, senior Bryan Padberg, who had three catches for 72 yards, Kollman caught a screen pass for a 46 yard gain, and Britt caught a 16 yard touchdown pass.

This victory cinched up the league for Heppner and allowed the Stanfield Tigers a second place finish.

The Mustangs will host Pine Eagle Friday night at 7:30 p.m. to start the first round of the state playoffs.
