An Environmental Assessment that addresses the harvest of timber for the Cabin Timber Sale is available for public review at the District Ranger's Office in Heppner, Oregon and the Forest Supervisor's Office in Pendleton, Oregon.

The proposed sale is located about 30 air miles south of Heppner, Oregon, in the Bull Prairie area. It is located in portions of Sections 13, 14, 15, 22, 23, 24, and 25, T. 7 S., R. 25 E.; W.M., Surveyed.

Alternative A maximizes wood fiber production on the area. 242 acres are brought under intensive timber management. This results in a harvest of 1.3 MMBF. Negative effects to big game are minimized as the amount of satisfactory cover remains unchanged.

Alternative B is the "No Action" alternative. This means no timber harvest at this time. Fiber production remains constrained and timber loss from mortality occurs. Negative effects to big game are minimized as the amount of satisfactory cover remains unchanged.

Based on the Environmental Analysis I have selected Alternative A for the development of this sale.

Alternative A provides the best combination of biological, physical, and economic benefits and is considered to be the recommended alternative. This alternative best maximizes wood fiber production while minimizing negative impacts on big game.

Based on the Environmental Analysis and previous experience I have determined that timber harvest activities will have no significant adverse environmental effects individually or cumulatively to either the biological or physical components of the human environment and is within the scope of the Heppner Planning Unit Environmental Impact Statement. Therefore, I find an Environmental Impact Statement is not needed.

Implementation of this project may take place immediately upon the signing and dating of this Decision Notice.

This decision is subject to appeal pursuant to 36 CFR 211.18. A written notice of appeal must be filed with the District Ranger within 45 days from the date of this Decision Notice.
