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Sheriff's Report

The Sheriff's office at the courthouse in Heppner reports dispatching the following business during the past week:

Dec. 27: Morrow County Sheriff's deputy responded to the Irrigon area to a report of suspicious circumstances. Report was unfounded;

Morrow County deputy located four cows on Hwy 74 near Cecil. Owner contacted to move them to safety;

Morrow County deputy began the investigation into the report of a broken vehicle window in Irrigon. Victim is the Morrow County School District, value was unknown;

Morrow County deputy assisted by Boardman Police department arrested Dan Greeley Price, 18, of Irrigon on Assault IV, Kidnapping II, Menacing, Criminal Mischief III and No Operator's License. Price was transported and lodged in Benton Co. Jail awaiting court arraignment;

Obituary

Stella M. Fielding

Stella M. Fielding, 93, of Hermiston, died Sunday, Jan. 1, 1989 at the Good Samaritan Center.

Graveside service was Tuesday at Lincoln Memorial park in Portland. A memorial service will be held later in the week at Good Samaritan Center in Hermiston.

She was born Feb. 22, 1895, at Albany, daughter of Lemuel and Rose N. Stove and had spent most of her life in Oregon with brief periods in Michigan, Montana and Washington.

In 1919, she married Harold S. Fielding. The couple had 11 children, four of whom died in infancy.

During World War II, she worked as a welder at one of the Portland shipyards and was also an excellent restaurant cook.

She had been a resident of Hermiston from 1966-1976 and from 1982 until her death.

Survivors include daughters Virginia Christensen and Crystal Huber, both of Portland, Pat Olson of Vernonia and Joy Mullin of Heppner; a son, Charles M. of Calistoga, Calif.; 11 grandchildren and 16 great grandchildren. Two other sons died earlier.
