They had to purchase their land for \$500,000 and all their building supplies (for example: each toothpick was \$10,000 and a day's supply of welding material (glue) cost \$850.)

A bus then took them on the famed Autobahn (a freeway in Germany that has no speed limit) to Rothenburg. Rothenburg means "wall around city" and it does have a wall around it.
