She left January 17 and returned January 22. Meg stayed with a school friend at Lake Bancroft, ten minutes from the center of Washington, D.C. Her friend and her husband have recently retired from government service. Meg and her friend were schoolmates in Newberg. Meg received invitations to inaugural balls and other activities but

only attended the parade and the swearing-in ceremonies. She said she enjoyed the parade most of all, watching it from a couple blocks away from the White House. The women's section in the Washington Post is called "Style".

Her trip was very interesting, and

Rural fire meeting held in Ione Feb. 8

A rural fire district will be the subject of a town hall meeting at the Ione High School cafeteria on Wednesday, February 8, at 7:30 p.m.

"A rural fire district was formed in the '50's," reports Clint Krebs, a rancher at Cecil who will preside at the meeting. "The district still exists. We just need to fund it."

On the agenda for the evening are Rich McFarland, the Deputy State Fire Marshal, Darrell Potter, Condon's Fire Chief, Jim Swanson, Ione insurance agent and Forrie Burkenbine, Heppner Fire Chief.

The purpose of the meeting is to

discuss the history of the fire district and the costs and benefits of activating it. "We want everyone to come to the meeting," said Krebs. "We need to hear all sides of the issue."

Krebs emphasized that the rural fire district is quite large. The district extends from Cecil on the north to Valby on the south, and from Cutsforth Corners to the county line.

A rural fire district will need a tax base to be voted on by those within the established district. The town hall meeting is being held to decide whether to ask for a tax base.
