

# Nelson introduces "Walleye Bill" Condon Blue Devils hand Ione 63-50 loss

State Representative Michael Nelson has drafted legislation which would pave the way for Boardman to host a national walleye fishing tournament. Nelson drafted the legislation at the request of several people in Morrow County concerned with economic development for the northern end of the county. The bill would exempt walleye fishing tournaments from the current \$50 limit on prize money for such contests. Representative Chuck Norris of Hermiston has agreed to co-sponsor the legislation.

Last year, Boardman hosted one of 15 nationwide events making up the National Open Walleye Classic, which will this year give away \$75,000 in prize money at the finals. The largest walleye caught on the entire circuit last year was at Boardman, which would give Boardman a good shot at hosting the finals in the near future. However, a state law limits such prizes to only \$50, eliminating Boardman from hosting the finals.

Nelson called the tournament "a classic example of economic development. If we could bring this event to Boardman, it would bring in new dollars that would spread throughout the area. With a \$75,000 purse, we're talking about a lot of people spending a lot of time and money in the area."

Ione met Condon Friday, February 10, in a game to determine if Ione would go into district. Ione faced early fouls and injury in their 50-63 loss to the Blue Devils.

Ione and Helix were tied for second place in the Big Sky League until Friday. Ione had beaten Helix twice before and were guaranteed a seat if they won their final three games.

The Cardinal's Dustin Padberg led Ione early with eight first quarter points and Brian Ball added a three point shot. Senior Keith Morter ended the game early with a second quarter shoulder injury which later turned out to be a broken collarbone.

Starters Kyle Broderick, Mike Garrett and Jim Davison were out early in the second quarter with three fouls each. Ione only scored 11 points in the second quarter led by four points by Mike Garrett. Ione was behind 37-24 at the half.

Brian Ball played a tough offensive game scoring nine points including a 3-point shot. Ball led Ione's scoring with 16 points. Ione outscored Condon in the third quarter 17-12.

Ione's Broderick fouled out in the fourth quarter with four points. Jim Davison fouled out in the fourth quarter with six points. The Cardinals were unable to pull it all together as they were outscored 9-14

in the fourth quarter and 50-63 in the entire game.

## PUBLIC NOTICE

This notice affects all persons, firms and corporations claiming an unrecorded right to the beneficial use of any surface water in Oregon which has not been adjudicated. Adjudication proceedings established rights to the use of water that began before the state's first water code was adopted in 1909. Adjudication proceedings have not been completed for the drainages west of the summit of the Coast Range, the Umpqua River Basin (except Cow Creek and Roberts Creek), the Willamette River and its tributaries above Corvallis and the Molalla-Pudding, Clackamas and Sandy Subbasins, for minor tributaries of the Columbia, Snake and Willamette Rivers or for minor tributaries of the Columbia, Snake and Willamette Rivers or for areas in southeastern Oregon where there is little water and is mostly in federal ownership.

TO WHOM IT MAY CONCERN:  
The Oregon Water Resources Department has begun accepting registration statements of claims to undetermined vested water rights.

State law (ORS 539.240) requires anyone who intends to file a registration statement of claim to surface waters of any unadjudicated stream system, file this written statement with the Department on or before December 31, 1992. Water use must have been initiated prior to February 24, 1909, and continued to the present time, without a period of five or more consecutive years of nonuse. Since water rights are a type of property right attached to the place of use, you may be a successor to a claim to a vested right, even if you were not the owner of the property when water use began.

Registration statement forms and instructions may be obtained from the Water Resources Department in Salem, Oregon, or at any of the Department's district watermaster offices. The mailing address for the Department is 3850 Portland Road NE, Salem, Oregon 97310.

Owners of land with a water right permit or certificate acquired after February 24, 1909, are not required to enter this proceeding to maintain the use authorized by the permit or certificate. However, they may appear and file in the proceeding to become a party to the proceedings as provided by ORS 539.070.

After the period for filing registration statements of claims has expired (December 31, 1992), the Water Resources Director will begin to determine the relative rights to the claimed uses of water.
