1. Don't get married.
2. Don't keep company with men.
3. Be home between the hours of 8 p.m. and 8 a.m. unless attending school functions.
4. Don't loiter downtown in ice cream stores.
5. Don't leave town at anytime without permission of the chairman of the board of trustees.
6. Don't smoke cigarettes.
7. Don't drink beer, wine or whiskey.
8. Don't ride in a carriage or auto with any man except brother or father.
9. Don't dress in bright colors.
10. Don't dye your hair.
11. Wear at least two petticoats.
12. Don't wear dresses any more than two inches above your ankles.
13. Keep school room clean and sweep daily. Scrub class room floors at least once a week with hot water and soap. Clean blackboard once a day and start fire at 7 a.m. so the school room will be warm when the children arrive at 8 a.m.
14. Don't use face powder, mascara or paint your lips.
15. Receive \$35 per month for eight months.

Fillies advance to Regional tournament with win against Wasco

After losing to Weston-McEwen Friday, the Heppner Fillies rebounded on Saturday and took charge of a close game with Wasco County in the fourth quarter to beat the Red-sides, 49-40. With the win, Heppner will continue their season in the Regional Tournament against Grant Union, Friday.
Sandi Turner scored six first period points as the Fillies took advantage of Wasco County early in the game. Heppner dominated the Red-sides inside and out during the first period to take a 10-4 lead.
With a triangle and two defense designed to stop Wasco County's leading scorers, Heppner shut down

the Red-sides again in the second period. Kim Stookey, Jill Conklin and Nance Wright played excellent defense to stop Patti Johnson and team leader Gretchen Peterson. Peterson and Johnson were held to just free throws in the first half.
The Fillies were victims of a poor shooting spell to open the second half and soon found themselves trailing 34-28. Turner provided some relief for Heppner scoring four points in the period. Jennifer Currin provided the punch for Heppner at the end of the third quarter, coming in to score five straight points.
Heppner had no trouble scoring from the foul line even though cold

from the rest of the floor. The Fillies began to mount a comeback in the middle of the final period. After numerous turnovers, Heppner finally hung on to the ball long enough to score. The Fillies tried to score and then a parade to the charity stripe began. All five of the Fillies took a free shot and together made 10-11 free throws in the final minutes. With eight seconds left on the clock, Currin stole the ball and drove down the floor for a lay-in and was fouled. Only one tick remained when Currin swished the Fillies' final point. The final score, 49-40, did not reveal how close the game had been.

Tami Lindsay and Turner shared game high honors with 14 points. They both also had 11 rebounds. Currin chipped in 12 points for Heppner. Peterson led the Red-sides with 10 points.

Heppner will face the Grant Union Prospectors in the Region D tournament in LaGrande on Friday at 1:30 p.m. at LaGrande High School. The Fillies must win two games in LaGrande to advance to the State tournament next week.

The Fillies will not be affected by the possible teacher strike. The OSAA rule is no school, no play. But Heppner will be allowed to play if school is closed through the end of the week for inservice training. Fortunately, coach Lee Padberg will not be affected as he is not a teacher. Assistant coach Rod Benson would not be able to coach, however.

Chief Rathbun's Tips

Minerals included in 'Economy of State of Oregon'

At the request of State Senator Gene Timms, R-Burns, the Economic Development Department included minerals in their recent "Economy of the State of Oregon" address to the Trade and Economic Development Committee. Minerals have not been included in the department's important testimony since Timms first took office in 1983. From 1980-86, the mineral industry provided the seven counties in Timms' district with \$7,772,001 in federal mineral leasing revenues alone. Of this amount, Morrow County received \$135,669.

Senator Timms is also meeting and working with officials of the Department of Geology and Mineral Industries and the Department of Environmental Quality. Timms anticipated that this will serve to coordinate the departments' mineral related activities and solve a current problem with restrictions on mining operations.

"The mineral industry is very important to Eastern Oregon. Its economic impact has virtually been overlooked," Senator Timms explains. The industry not only provides counties with mineral leasing revenues, but also has provided about \$5 million to the state's Common School Fund since 1981. "I'm working to get lottery funds set aside specifically for the purpose of geological mapping. Knowing where the minerals are is vital, especially when proposals for wilderness areas on federal lands are being reviewed. Without good mapping, we could miss out on some potentially big revenues from the mining industry."
