Road Report

Winter damage to roads is a great concern to everyone as well as the road department. This year county road conditions are in good shape following the bad weather. This can be attributed to the great cooperation and concern received from all users of our roads during the restrictions.

Load limits are still on all county roads with the exception of Bombing Range, North Patterson Ferry, Frontage and Pole Line roads, which have had the restrictions lifted. Restrictions will be lifted with improving weather.

Five miles of Upper Rhea Creek will have crushed rock applied in preparation for paving later this summer. The rock for this project is currently being produced by the county crusher.

Work is in progress on Paul Smith Road in Boardman with sub-base and base being placed. This one-half mile of road is to be paved in May.

Some minor road damage has been noted from run-off, but as weather improves road graders will be operating.

Coombs conviction upheld by Court of Appeals

The Oregon Court of Appeals has let stand the 1988 convictions of a Boardman man on sex-related charges. Simrall Coombs, 70, was convicted in January, 1988, in Morrow County Circuit Court of Sodomy I, Sodomy II and Sodomy III and Sexual Abuse in the First Degree. Coombs was sentenced to a

total of nine years in prison, with a mandatory minimum sentence of 3 1/2 years, and fined a total of \$20,000. The Court of Appeals affirmed Coombs conviction without opinion on February 15 according to Morrow County District Attorney Jeff Wallace.


