Jacob fleece are very rare and originally came from England. They are white sheep with black, brown or gray spots and have two, four or

more horns.

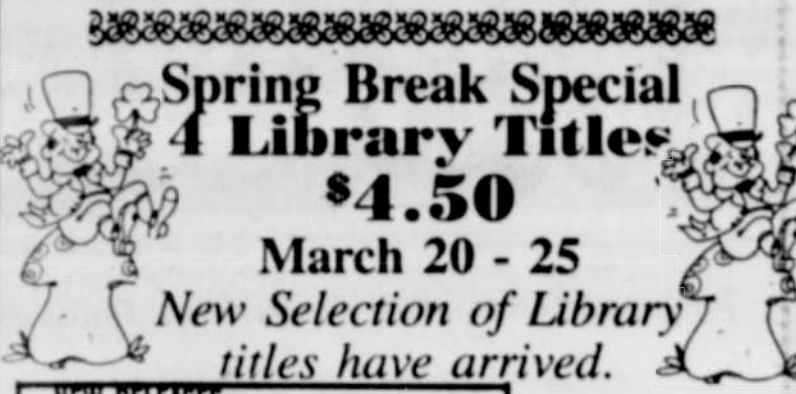
The angle weave loom was made especially for this demonstration by Bill Sowell of Heppner. It is made of hardwood and has 480 nails in it.

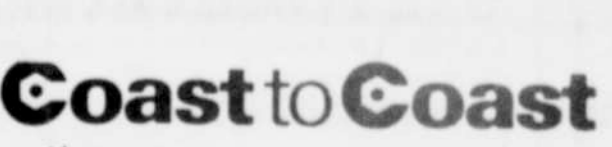
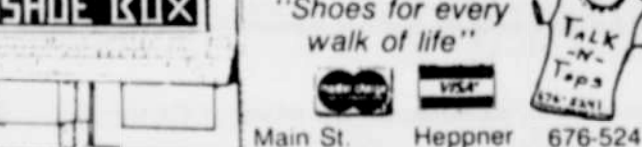
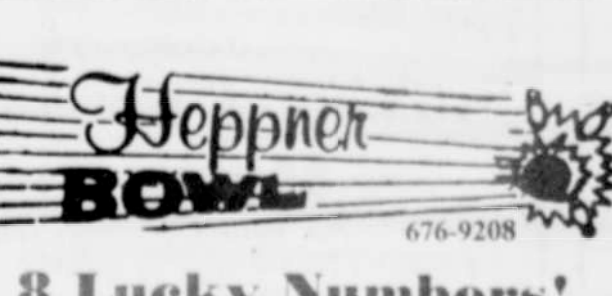
Horses Etc.
