

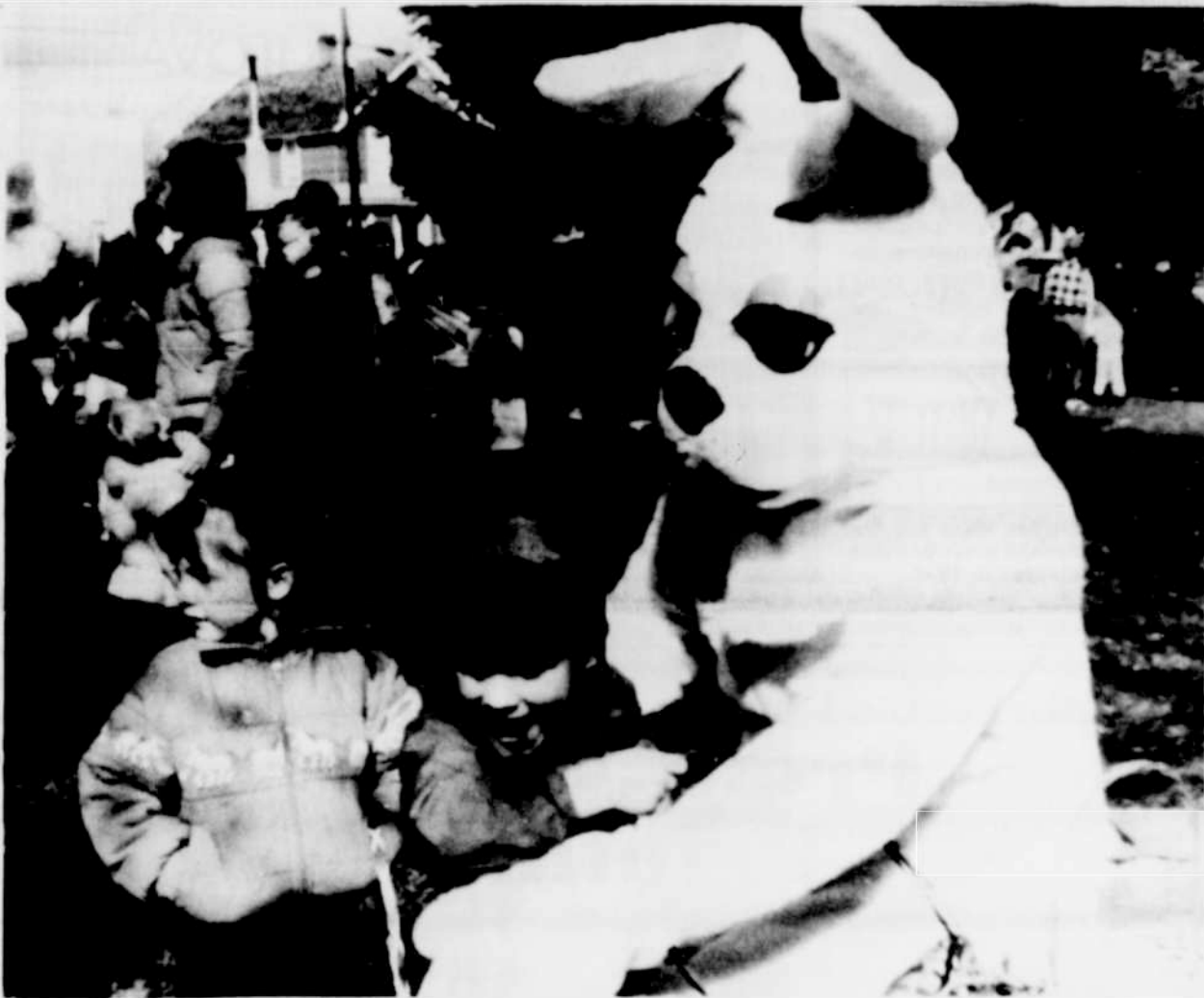

Youth Conservation Corp Applications available

This summer high school students will have the opportunity to work in the Umatilla National Forest through the Youth Conservation Corps program (YCC).

Students between the ages of 15-18 years will be involved in conservation projects on the Heppner Ranger District in the following resources: timber, fisheries, wildlife, recreation and maintenance.

Projects targeted vary from constructing trails, marking trees for wildlife, fisheries improvements, painting buildings, removing protective screens from seedlings, constructing a bridge at Bull Prairie Lake, collecting litter, creek bank stabilization, fence removing, installing signs, and noxious weed control.

Applications are available at the Heppner Ranger District and at area high schools. Students will receive \$3.35/hour and will work eight hour days for five weeks. Applications are due April 14 in the Heppner Ranger District.

This summer to allow more students to participate in the YCC program, there will be two crews each working five weeks. The first work crew will begin June 7 through July 11 and the second crew will start on July 12 and finish August 18. Each crew will consist of two boys and two girls. Applicants will need to sign up for the work session they prefer. Participants will be chosen by a random selection drawing April 17 at the district and be notified.

YCC is a summer employment program administered through several agencies including the U.S. Forest Service, Department of Interior, Fish and Wildlife Service and National Park Service.
