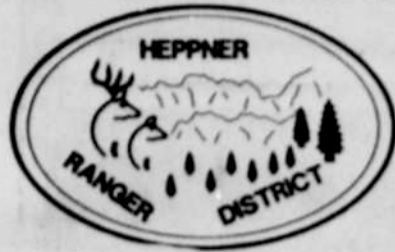


Summer employment available at Forest Service



An opportunity to work in the National Forest awaits adults this summer.

Heppner Ranger District offers summer employment for adults 18

and older. Participants will work in several areas including: timber pre-sale, marking and inventory; fire management and suppression; surveying roads; stream and fish enhancement and range conservation, hancement and range conservation.

Approximately 14 positions are June through August. However some jobs may begin earlier and last till November.

School support group met March 28

"Yes For Kids", a group of Morrow County parents and community members met on March 28 in Lexington. This group was organized in September of 1988 as a positive support group working to secure adequate funding for the Morrow County School District. The focus of the Tuesday night meeting was to discuss ways to support the upcoming Morrow County School levy election to be held May 16. The group organized into committees to work more effectively. "Yes For Kids" includes community members from Boardman, Heppner, Irrigon,

Lexington and Ione.

The group will be conducting a telephone survey of voters in Morrow County to determine the level of support and areas of support for the May 16 levy election. Registered voters can expect an inquiry from this group during the month of April. This funding will be necessary to maintain the current level of programs and quality of education for the county's school children. Morrow County Schools will require the support provided by this levy whether or not the statewide tax base measure for schools is successful.

4-H Summer week registration forms available

Morrow County 4-H members in grades eight through 12 are receiving information and registration forms this week for this year's 4-H Summer Week at Oregon State University according to Bill Broderick, Oregon State University Extension agent.

Those planning to attend the June 19-23 event must return their registration forms to the county Extension office in Heppner by April 17, Broderick said. Scholarships, contributed by local organizations and businesses, are available to help cover costs.

Those attending the 1989 Summer Week will choose from among 90 different classes, including a group

of classes called "Project Discovery," which focus on specific 4-H projects. Project discovery will allow an indepth look at a 4-H area of interest, including career possibilities, subject matter and decision-making.

Afternoons will find the young people involved in a variety of leisure education activities.

"Toward the 90's" is the theme of the 75th annual 4-H event on the OSU campus in Corvallis.

County 4-H members who do not receive information about summer week are asked to contact their county Extension office for the information, Broderick said.

Business management workshop scheduled

A four part series of workshops in business management will be offered by the Heppner office of the Oregon State University Extension Service beginning April 11, according to Extension agent Fred Lundin. The program is an introduction to business management and is designed for beginning businesses, though everyone is welcome. The classes offered will be: Tuesday, April 11-Customer Relations and Basic Bookkeeping; Monday, April 17-Balance sheets, P & L Statements and Breakeven costs; Tuesday April 25-Business Plans and Proposals and

Tuesday, May 2-Marketing, Pricing and Computer Applications.

Classes will begin at 7 p.m. and end at 9:30 p.m. They will be held at the Extension office meeting room in Heppner. Pre-registration is requested, with a fee of \$5 per person per class, or \$15 for all four classes. Register at the Extension office 676-9642 prior to April 9.

The training is being done by BMCC's Small Business Development Center. Anyone interested in the classes should contact Fred Lundin.
