

Mustang tracksters finish second

The Heppner boys withstood very hot and humid conditions Saturday at the Columbia Basin Conference Track meet to finish second behind Wahtonka.

Steve Arbogast, Mike Correa and Bryan Padberg led the way in the Mustang's final tune-up before the district meet winning their events. Arbogast won the 100 meter dash in 13.4, Padberg the 800 meter run in 2:02.8, and Correa running the 200 meter dash for the first time clocked 23.3.

Heppner's 1,600 meter relay team was also a first place finisher with a time of 3:34.08.

Correa teamed with Arbogast in

the 100 to take a one-two finish. He ran the race in :11.5. Barney Lindsay took second place in the 400 meter dash with a :54.3 and Padberg was close behind with a time of :54.5.

Heppner's 400 meter relay team of Lindsay, Correa, Jess Osmin and Arbogast rounded out the top three place finishers, running the race in :46.07.

Rounding out the Heppner scoring were Lindsay's fourth place finish in the long jump with a mark of 17'9", Jay Michael's fourth in the 800 at 2:13.94, Dean Munker's fourth in the javelin with a personal best of 142'10", Osmin was fifth in the 300

meter hurdles with a time of :47.1, Gabe Garcia and David McCurry also received fifth place finishes in the 800 and 3,000 meter run respectively.

In the girls' competition Heppner finished 7th with 17 points.

Amy Brownfield won the only event for Heppner taking the 3,000 in 12:40. Sheryl Conklin placed fifth in both hurdle races clocking :20.52 in the 110 hurdles and 1:01.44 in the 300 meter race.

Rounding out the scoring for the Fillies was Jill Conklin who was fifth in the long jump and sixth in the 800.

D.A.'s Report

Eric Pohemus, was sentenced in Morrow County Circuit Court on April 28 following his guilty plea to Criminal Mischief in the First Degree.

Polhemus, 40, was arrested February 15, following an incident in which a Greyhound bus was diverted to Boardman from its regular route. He has been held in the Benton County Jail since that time.

Circuit Court Judge Pro-Tem Ralph Currin sentenced Polhemus to 78 days in jail, with credit for time served, and placed him on two years informal probation on the condition that he seek mental health evaluation and treatment, and obey all laws.

James Mabe of Boardman was sentenced Friday in Morrow County Circuit Court on burglary and public indecency charges.

Mabe, 19, had earlier plead guilty to Burglary in the First Degree, Theft in the First Degree and Public Indecency as a result of incidents occurring in and near Boardman this past December and January.

Circuit Court Judge Pro-Tem Ralph Currin suspended imposition of sentence and ordered Mabe to serve 180 days in jail, be placed on five years formal probation, make restitution totaling \$982, be evaluated as a sex offender and undergo sex offender treatment as directed by his probation officer.
