

Boys advance to State Track meet

Under ideal conditions at the District 7-A track and field meet the Heppner boys scored 75 points to propel them to a second place finish behind Wahtonka.

Five boys qualified for the State "A" track and field meet which will be held May 19-20 at Springfield High School.

Mike Correa led the way for Heppner winning the 200 meter dash in :22.96 and the 400 in :50.6. Steve Arbogast combined with Correa to take a Mustang sweep in the sprints. Arbogast won the 100 in :11.56.

Bryan Padberg was the other district champion for Heppner. He took the 1,500 in season's best time of 4:05.3 and also won the 3,000 in 9:00.8.

Also running a best time this season was the 1,600 meter relay team of Correa, Padberg, Arbogast and Barney Lindsay. They ran 3:33.09 to win that event and advance to state.

The final event that the Mustangs were able to advance in was the 400 meter relay. Lindsay, Correa, Arbogast and Jess Osmin teamed up to run :45.91 and take second.

Shot putter Tim Hays had the next best finish for Heppner, finishing fourth throwing 40'7". Osmin was fifth in the 300 intermediate hurdles. Lindsay received a sixth place in the long jump and Jay Michael and David McCurry were sixth in the 800 and 3,000 respectively.

Others competing for Heppner were Dean Munkers, Al Burt and Ken Wallace in the throwing events. Charlie Rathbun in the hurdles and Seth Moses in the 3,000.

"I was very pleased with the way everyone performed, and I think we have a good chance of doing well at State," stated coach Dale Conklin.

Padberg will be trying to defend his state titles in the 1,500 and 3,000 and looks to have an excellent chance of doing so. The Mustangs

are defending State Champions, but don't look to repeat.

"We don't have as many people going to state as we did last year, and I think that there are other teams that are better than us. But if everyone performs as well as they can, you never know what might happen," commented Conklin.

In the girls' competition, Heppner only had two girls place. Wasco County won the girls' title and Helix was second.

Kim Stookey was fourth in the 300 hurdles with a time of :52.7. She was also expected to run the 100 hurdles, but false started and was disqualified.

Amy Brownfield finished fifth in the 3,000 running 12:59.55.

Sheryl Conklin ran both hurdle races and long jumped, Jill Conklin long jumped and ran the 800 and Mary Connor and Dana Hudson competed in the throwing events to round out the girls' squad.

Lyme disease is found in Oregon

Lyme disease, unheard of 20 years ago, is becoming a most talked about disease of the 80's, next to AIDS. Three geographic areas account for 85% of all cases: the Eastern Seaboard, Wisconsin and Minnesota and California and Oregon. Lyme disease seems to be on the increase and no one is sure why.

The carrier of the disease is a tiny brown deer or bear tick, about 1/8 the size of a common wood tick. It prefers deer to live on, but also is found on mice, other mammals, wild birds, shrubs and grasses. The ticks, being so small, have a bite that is often not noticed and many Lyme disease cases do not remember a tick bite at all. The disease can't be passed from person to person nor is there evidence that it is transmitted in food.

A classic rash, resembling a bull's eye or target around the bite, is

usually seen. Often it is painless, but may feel hot, burn or itch and usually appears within a month after the bite. Victims also may have some, all or none of the following symptoms: headache, chills, nausea, fever, aching joints and tiredness. Left untreated, people with Lyme disease can experience blindness, neurological disorders, heart problems, encephalitis, or attacks of arthritis weeks to years after the bite.

If you have any symptoms and recall being in an area where ticks might have been, discuss the possibility of Lyme disease with your doctor. Antibiotics usually ward off later complications.

Preventing tick bites is your best protection. When you plan to be outdoors, especially in areas where Lyme disease is prevalent, wear protective clothing. (long-sleeved shirts,

pants tucked into boots or socks), sprayed with insect repellent. Routinely check for ticks on yourself, children and pets. Remove attached ticks by grasping with tweezers at the point where the tick's mouth enters the skin. Save the tick, wrapped in a moist tissue in a dated jar in the refrigerator. If you develop symptoms later, your doctor may be able to have a lab check it to determine if it was infected.

Remember, if treated early, most victims recover completely.
