



I saw the first elm leaf beetles of the year last month, and the first eggs on the leaves last week. It is about time to spray the elm trees to control this noxious pest.

Elm leaf beetles are the reason that all the elm trees turn brown about halfway through the summer. The adult and larval stages both feed on the leaves, skeletonizing them. Their feeding can defoliate a tree and weaken it.

The beetle is about 1/5 inch long. It is a light yellow to a brownish green color, almost a chartreuse, with several black stripes down its back. The eggs are laid on the underside of the leaves of the elm tree. They are bright yellow and are laid in double rows.

The time to spray the tree is when all the eggs have hatched, so examine the leaves of the tree for the opened egg cases. Or you can wait until you begin to see feeding damage in the tree.

The young immatures feed on only one surface of the leaf at a time, resulting in a lacey look to the leaf. Trees take on a yellowish or brownish look, and leaves begin to fall off. If the beetles are not controlled, the tree will defoliate completely by midsummer.

Adult beetles are quite active and mobile. They will fly to new, unfested elm trees and lay eggs and feed. It may be necessary to apply two or more sprays per year to control damage.

Most elm trees are beyond the capability of the homeowner to spray, and require professional help. Two chemicals available to the homeowner are registered-carbaryl (Sevin) and Orthene. Read the label carefully and follow label directions.

Another pest of elm trees is the elm bark beetle. I have not seen any bark beetles in Heppner, yet. This is the insect that vectors Dutch elm disease, a fungal disease that kills the tree. While Dutch elm disease is known to be in eastern Oregon, I have not seen it here either.

Control of bark beetles is not recommended except as a procedure to suppress Dutch elm disease. There is no evidence to indicate that sprays or injections will stop the spread of the disease, or will effectively control the beetle.

These two pests make owning an elm tree difficult. They are not

enough to force you to remove the tree, however. With one or two control sprays per year, and with a little luck concerning Dutch elm disease, an elm tree will provide abundant beauty and shade for many years.

June is tour month for the agricultural community. We tour weeds, grass, cattle and crops, and have a barbecue at the drop of a hat. The only requirement may be to bring a bowl of salad along.

First is a Weed and Cereal Tour on June 9. That's Friday and the tour starts at the Frank Anderson Farm near Ruggs at 1 p.m. On the tour we will look at the weed control in CRP and at cereal variety trials. The tour culminates in a barbecue at the Lone Park at 5:30 p.m.

Oregon State University Experiment Stations have two tours in this area in June (a third tour, that of the Hermiston Experiment Station is already past). Wednesday, June 14 is the tour of the Pendleton Experiment Station. Thursday, June 15 is the Sherman County Experiment Station tour at Moro. Both tours start at 8 a.m. and last all day. They are worth the effort to attend, even for the novice.

On June 16, Friday, at 4 p.m. we tour this year's winner of the Conservation Farm of the Year award. At 6 p.m. we enjoy a barbecue. This year's winner is Starvation Farms, and the tour and barbecue will be at Irvin Rauch's house. We encourage attendees to bring a salad or dessert and to call the Extension office to coordinate the food. The steak is free and everyone is invited.

For more information on any of these tours, please call the Extension Office. We will be glad to arrange car pools, give directions, or coordinate salads and desserts. See you at the barbecue.
