Senior center paying its way

Heppner City Attorney Bill Kuhn had some good news about the St. Patrick's Senior Center Tuesday, when he announced that 13 tenants are living in the center.

"It is now paying its way," Kuhn told the Heppner Chamber of Commerce, "and we should have 15 by the end of June."

There had been some concern that the housing center was not filling up with tenants fast enough, but Tuesday's announcement should put those fears to rest.

"It's amazing that it filled up in six months," Kuhn said, pointing to similar projects in other cities which have not filled up as quickly.

Kuhn gave much of the credit for

renting the specially designed senior apartments to Joyce Kay Hollomon who spent quite a bit of time showing the rooms to prospective renters.

In other good news, Kuhn said ownership of the hotel has been placed with a newly formed housing authority, which should allow the city to keep from paying up to \$17,000 per year in property taxes, an expense the city did not foresee when the hotel was built. "We had only budgeted for \$3,500," Kuhn said.

He also pointed out that work on the hotel project is not completed, and the community would be called upon to finish landscaping in the back of the hotel.

USDA announces 1990 wheat program

Secretary of Agriculture Clayton Yeutter announced a required 5-percent acreage reduction May 31, 1989. Several other provisions for the 1990 wheat program were announced.

-The established target price is \$4 per bushel, the statutory minimum, and down about two percent from the 1989 target price.

-There will be no paid land diversion.

-No marketing loan or related program provision will be implemented.

-Weighted national loan rate before reduction is \$2.44 per bushel and after reduction is \$1.95 per bushel.

-The 0/92 program will be available.

-Additional yield provisions are applicable if the 1990 farm program yield established for the crop is less than 90-percent of the 1985 farm program payment yield for the crop.

-Other details as well as Feed grain provisions will be announced later.
