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Sheriff's Report

The Sheriff's office at the courthouse in Heppner reports dispatching the following business during the past week:

May 29: Morrow County Sheriff's office dispatched the Boardman ambulance to a motorcycle accident on I-84, eastbound at milepost 150. Investigation is being handled by the Oregon State Police. One subject was transferred to Good Shepherd Hospital.

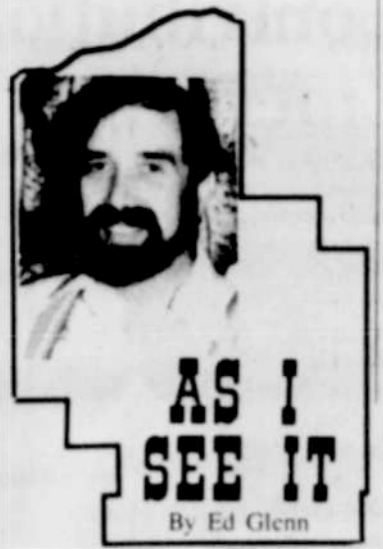

A Common Mistake



We just read a comment "When all the big trees are gone, there will only be little trees." It was made by an 11 year-old in support of the spotted owl.

We think that this young person was making the same common mistake that most adults make. And they make that mistake when talking about the spotted owl, the Exxon Valdez, the China Revolution, the school situation and their least favorite (or favorite) politician.

Things will not always be as they are right now.

Just this last spring, Francie and I had occasion to carefully examine our own position, past, present and future. Some aspects of the present were not too desirable and we seriously considered a change of scenery. But we looked at the past fifteen years we've lived in Morrow County and listed the way things have changed just in that time.

We've seen several County Judges come and go, the PGE plant constructed, the town of Boardman grow from 400 to 1400 and the price of wheat bounce up and down and up again.

Applying that past history to the future, we realized that just as today is not the same as the past was, so too the future will not be the same as today.

Many things, circumstances, conditions will change in the future, some of them making a dramatic change in our lives.

The common mistake our young friend made is that little trees have a habit of growing into big trees. True, it may take a while, but even 15 years makes a big difference in the life of a tree. The pines in our back yard were very little live Christmas trees just eight and seven years ago. Now they're much taller than the house.

The old adage, "Time heals all wounds," really has a great deal going for it. We think that philosophy reflects another observation of ours: Ol' Mother Nature has a way of taking care of herself. It truly is amazing the way the natural order of things puts many things right that man has messed up. The Tillamook Burn is one example that comes to mind. Yellowstone Park and the Valdez oil slick are two current examples of man messing up that in due time Mother Nature will heal.

But there are a whole range of things that man has created, that it is up to man to change when they go bad. The ethics of Congressmen, for example, is a man made problem that man must correct. There seems to be some progress on that front right now. Some would argue that it is too little too late, but sometimes it's like growing a tree, it takes time.

Take any politician, local, state or national that is ineffective, incompetent, or down right crooked (some folks say that is all of them). Politicians, like oil slicks, have a habit of going away. In our country we just vote 'em out, some places they assassinate 'em. Either way they don't last forever.

None of us can do much about the way Mother Nature restores a forest. Yes, there are thinning techniques, fertilizer and specie selection, but the job is basically hers.

With man made problems, we can do a great deal about correcting them. In fact, since we created the problem it is entirely up to us to correct it. And the point is some of us will. Always and every time. Sometimes it's easy and quick. Sometimes it takes much longer and more dedication. But somehow, some time, all of man's problems are corrected by man. Things never stay the same as they are today.

And the mistake is to assume they will.

The great challenge for each of us is to be part of the solution. There is not a great deal we can do to speed up the little tree's journey to become a big one. But there is a great deal we can do about when and where and how to cut the big ones. It is entirely up to us as to decide how much and to whom we pay taxes, how and by whom we are governed, when, where and whether we educate our children.

None of things will always be as they are now. We should not assume they will be. They will change, just as surely as the tree grows. Each of us should be a ray of sun.
