Family fun days set at 4-H center

The second annual 4-H natural resources family fun day is set for Saturday, August 26, at the Oregon 4-H Center near Salem, according to Bill Broderick, Oregon State University Extension agent in Morrow County.

The event will include the state 4-H forestry and natural resources identification contests which will be held at the 4-H Center rather than the Oregon State Fairgrounds.

Persons participating in the two contests will be asked to identify live specimens found along center trails as well as mounted species.

During the day long program,

4-H'ers and their families will be involved in a variety of activities and classes about such subjects as entomology, pond ecology, archery and air rifles. Those attending do not have to be enrolled in 4-H natural science projects.

Persons planning to attend the natural resources day are asked to register by August 1 at a cost of \$3 per person. Persons registering at the door will be charged \$5. Registration forms are available from the Morrow County Extension office in Heppner. There is no fee for 4-H members participating in the identification contests.

Sherman and Iona Murray, Ione, recently attended the British Columbia Country Music Awards, held in Vancouver, B.C. in the Commodore Ballroom.

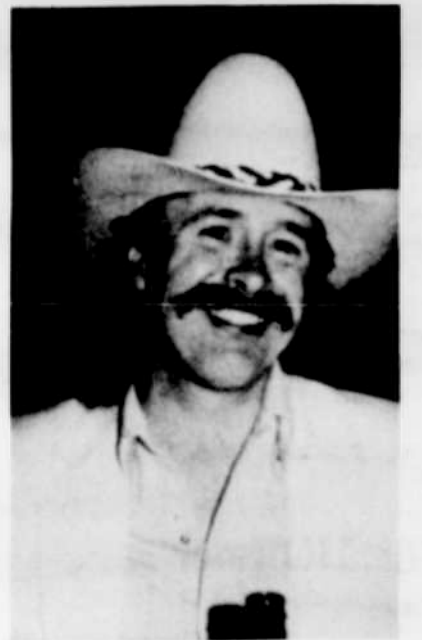
They had a very good reason for attending this particular award ceremony. Their son, Nolan, 30, received the award of Country Music Instrumentalist of the Year for B.C.

Nolan is the first U.S. citizen to win this country music award.

He has been playing professionally since he first graduated from high school. For two years, he taught fiddle and guitar lessons at Blue Mountain Community College, where he was hired strictly on his merits, since he cannot read music and plays entirely by ear.

Nolan makes a winter and summer tour with the Patsy Conroy Band. They will soon be playing at the Calgary Stampede. They will go on from there to Craven where a number of U.S. stars will also be playing. The group just recently
