County Agent's Corner

The Russian wheat aphid (RWA) has been a very nasty pest on spring crops this year, though not a very bad one on winter wheat. Many spring grains have been sprayed twice and are infested again. It is simply not economic to spray for the RWA that often in spring grains.

Another problem is that the insecticides are not terribly effective on leaves that are tightly rolled and are chlorotic. The plant is not translocating very much material in that leaf, and hence the aphids do not get the necessary dose of pesticide. And a heavier dose isn't the answer because the plant won't translocate a heavier dose any better than the lighter one.

Late in the season it is best to spray with the least expensive material available, since the systemic action isn't needed for persistence nor is it very effective in the tightly rolled leaf. It isn't needed because once the wheat is in the soft dough stage of growth, the aphid can no longer affect yield. If the wheat is close to maturity, a persistent insecticide isn't necessary.

Lorsban (chlorpyrifos) may be

available this fall in Oregon, but is not yet registered on RWA here. Its fumigant action is reported to have achieved excellent results in Colorado, though there is no supportive data in the PNW yet on efficacy of pesticides on RWA.

On a different note, Curtail is a herbicide that has been available for some time for use in wheat. It contains clopyralid and 2,4-D. Clopyralid is a selective broadleaf herbicide that is particularly effective on hard-to-kill composite weeds like Canada thistle, yet is safer, ecologically, than picloram (Tordon), since it does not persist in the soil as long.

Clopyralid is now available in Oregon. It is registered (trade name Stinger) for use on pastures and rangeland. Curtail and Curtail M (clopyralid + MCPA) are not yet registered on pastures and rangeland, but may be this fall.
