The owners of the bed and breakfast, Larry and Darlene Scroggins, moved to Heppner after purchasing the house from Bob and Aloha DeSpain in February and began converting it into a bed and breakfast. Larry and Darlene had their own home construction business in Portland for 20 years

before moving here. Darlene also was a real estate agent. Among her other capabilities, Darlene is a professional seamstress and interior decorator. Larry is doing the remodeling of the house and Darlene paints and decorates.

The Penland House was built in 1885 and is an outstanding example of Victorian architecture. Originally an Italianate design, the Queen Ann tower was added sometime after the Heppner flood in 1903. The

Penland House is noted for its gracious hospitality, victorian charm, quiet surroundings and full breakfast.

Barbecue tickets available through June 30

Round-Up Wagon Train Master has given permission to extend steak barbecue ticket sales through Friday, June 30. Take this opportunity to join members of the 7th annual Round-Up Wagon Train as they celebrate arrival at their destination. Welcome them as they roll into Heppner at 11 a.m. July 3 and join them for awards and entertainment that evening at the Morrow County Fairgrounds for the steak barbecue.

It's "Wagons Ho" as ranchers, businessmen, white and blue collar workers all become early settlers this week. Wagons drawn by horses and mules, horseback riders and saddlesore walkers will all be a part of the group. Many returning "pioneers" have some real adventure stories to share about past trips. The bumping of iron wheels and clippety-clop of horses hooves will

travel from Cunningham corrals at Battle Mountain to Sugar Bowl the first day, a journey of ten miles. Day 2 will take them 14 miles to Arbuckle Corral with an overnight stay and a journey of 11 miles along the north fork of Willow Creek to Wilkinson Ranch. An eleven mile trip the fourth day will bring them into Heppner, a bit weary from the bone-jarring affair. One of the participants last year related that "the pioneers used to put their cream in a jar and tie it to a wheel. As it went around it, it churned the butter."

Although these "pioneers" aren't roughing it like their ancestors did 140 years ago (pioneers didn't have roads, showers, and catered meals) this will be an experience they won't soon forget. Be on hand at 11 a.m. to welcome them with Heppner hospitality.
