Long time Heppner doctor passes away

Longtime Heppner resident and medical doctor in the Heppner area, Dr. Wallace Wolff, passed away in Heppner Friday, June 30 at the age of 72.

Dr. Wolff came to Heppner in 1952, buying out the practice of Dr. Richard O'Shea, who had entered the army. He was here one year, before he, too, left for the army, returning in 1953 to continue his practice.

Dr. Wolff had delivered babies, done surgery and practiced psychiatry during his time in Heppner. This combination of medicine is almost unheard of in this day of specialization.

Dr. Wolff was born in 1916 on a Montana ranch to Ira John and Sophie Marie, moving to Wisconsin when he was 6 years old. He graduated from medical school from the University of Wisconsin in 1947, completed his internship, spent two years residency in Seattle and worked for a doctor in White Salmon, Wa., before coming to Heppner in 1952.

He and his wife Rita, who preceded him in death in 1976, had five children.

His children include sons William A. of Manhattan, Kan. and Thomas F. of Salem, and daughters Kelley

Janzen, Baker, Kathleen Jansen, Portland and Shelley Gustafson, Hillsboro.

An avid gardener, Dr. Wolff was a charter member of the Heppner Garden Club, past president of the Heppner Chamber of Commerce, Elks member and member of the Morrow County School Board for 12 years.

Dr. Wolff is also a Past Exalted Ruler of B.P.O.E. No. 358.

He has served as medical advisor to a nurse practitioner in Condon and Fossil for two years and was on several other medical related boards and associations. He was selected as Man of the Year for Heppner for 1987.

A retirement dinner was held in his honor in November 1988, after announcing his retirement from 36 years of practicing medicine. It was pointed out at this time, that Pioneer Memorial Hospital would have had to close its doors had it not been for him keeping up his practice. He was the only doctor practicing in the area.

He was given an all-expense paid trip to Australia and New Zealand as a token of the town's appreciation of the care he had given it.

He will surely be missed for his service to this community.
