Steve Dickenson, 37, has accepted a contract offer to be the principal at Heppner High School beginning immediately. He replaces Jim Bier who resigned effective in July after many years at Heppner High School. Mr. Dickenson received his Bachelor's Degree from Linfield College in 1975 and Master's Degree from Southern Oregon State College in 1979. He earned administrative certification from the University of Oregon in 1981. This

is his fifteenth year in education in Oregon schools. Prior to coming to Heppner, Dickenson taught in Oregon high schools for six years, was assistant principal for six years and spent the last two years as principal in Newberg. He and his wife Kathi, have three children 12, 10, and 8 years old. School will begin in Morrow County on August 29.
