Youth services change planned

While change is sometimes difficult to implement in Oregon communities, there will be some changes in youth services as mandated by the recent legislature.

Under HB 3466 a new youth commission is being formed both at the state level and on the county level which will replace the existing Oregon Juvenile Services Commission. The bill consolidates the Juvenile Services Commission, the Student Retention Initiative, and the Great Start program into one new agency.

Under this act, it is the responsibility of the county court along with the juvenile judge to form a new local Community Children and Youth Services Commission. The law requires that appointments represent a balance among persons who have a knowledge of issues related to young children, children at risk of institutionalization at state training schools, and children at risk of dropping out of school. Those adults that have an interest in children (business people, parents and community leaders), are being recruited.

Because of this mandate by the legislature, Juvenile Judge Louis Carlson has arranged for and is inviting interested citizens to a round table discussion on issues, programs and possibilities for Morrow County children this Thursday night at the Dodge City meeting room in Boardman.

The meeting will begin at 5 p.m.

and will continue through a light supper with Mr. Stan Foster of Pendleton acting as facilitator. Marion Smith from Salem will also be attending to assist with the discussion. Marion is with the Governor's staff working on the Children's Agenda. In addition, Mary Ann Buchanan of Salem, will assist in the discussion. She is newly appointed to the Oregon State Youth Commission.

Topics of discussion will surround existing programs such as latchkey, responsible adulthood workshops, student tutor programs, crossroads, sexual abuse programs, day care centers, 4-H game club and drug and alcohol education. Interested citizens are urged to attend so that priority programs can be written and properly funded for future years, Carlson said.

Fire marshal says card lock sales laws sufficient, enforceable

State Fire Marshal Olin Greene said today that he has met with staff from the State Attorney General's Office and confirmed that existing state laws are sufficient to enforce both the ban on self-service gasoline sales and the operation of cardlock gasoline sales operations.

Greene is sending a letter to this effect to eight Eastern Oregon county district attorneys. The attorneys contacted him recently about increasing complaints of cardlock gasoline sales violations in their area. The cardlock companies were allegedly operating as self-service retail stations. The county district attorneys asked the State Fire Marshal to issue citations to card lock

operators who were violating the law.

Self-service by customers at retail gasoline stations is a criminal offense and must be handled at the local level by law enforcement personnel according to the State Fire Marshal's legal counsel. The violation is a Class C misdemeanor offense.

Operators of cardlock sales operations may also be cited if local law officers find that there is probable cause to believe that a violation has occurred.

Greene said that his office will continue to work closely with local district attorneys and law enforcement agencies to help them enforce State gasoline dispensing laws.

Grass bugs a nuisance

In Oregon, primarily east of the Cascade mountains, grass bugs frequently invade buildings and become a nuisance pest. The name grass bug is a common name given to several species of bugs belonging to the genus "Arhyssus." These insect transients enter homes, offices, and other buildings in the fall and early winter seeking sheltered sites to pass the winter months.

Grass bugs are 1/4 to 3/8 of an inch long, with variable colored bodies. Usually they appear grayish or tan on top and light green underneath. Often they have small reddish to brown blotches on the legs and body. The body is covered with numerous short hairs and the slender antennae are about a third of the length of the body. Grass bugs also have a must scent.

As their name implies, grass bugs are found on grass and other native plants. There is usually one generation each year. By the end of summer, populations are at their highest. With the onset of cooler fall temperatures, the adults instinctively

seek sheltered places to spend the winter. It is then they enter homes and other buildings. Warm indoor temperatures allow them to continue to be active and fly or crawl about. Eventually they will use up their energy reserves and die. Often they will congregate near windows, entrances, or on outside walls with warmer southern exposures.

Indoors, grass bugs do not cause any damage. When in high numbers they are merely a nuisance. Control of grass bugs with insecticides is generally not recommended, although common household insecticides will kill them. Simply removing them with a broom or vacuum cleaner is the best method of control.

Outdoors, some control may be obtained by spraying foundation areas, window frames, shutters an entry areas with a residual insecticide, such as chlorpyrifos, when the first grass bugs are seen. Look for Safer's insecticidal soap sprays for use. Spray wherever insects congregate. Do not expect complete control.
