

## Students to meet with college reps

Students from Heppner and Lone High Schools will go to Riverside High School for a meeting with representatives of Oregon's state colleges and universities on September 27, 1989 at 1 p.m.

This program supplements the guidance program of area high schools by giving students first-hand information about program of study offerings, admission requirements, student support services, housing, costs to attend, financial aid, scholarships, and other information important to post-high school planning.

Parents are also encouraged to attend the program which will feature individual information sessions with representatives from Eastern Oregon State College, Western Oregon State

College, Oregon Institute of Technology, Oregon State University, Portland State University, Southern Oregon State College and the University of Oregon.

The Oregon State System of Higher Education high school visitation program reaches almost all public and private high schools in Oregon. The program's goal is to stimulate good post-high school planning and decision-making by students, and to provide them with an introduction to the educational and career opportunities available through Oregon's state colleges and universities.

A driving class for seniors is planned in October. They also like the 10 percent reduction in insurance which all insurance companies in Oregon after Jan. 1, 1990, are required to give to those who have completed the course.

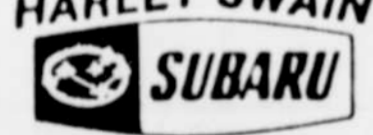

## EASTERN OREGON OUTDOORS

The Oregon Fish and Wildlife Commission last August approved the proposed dates and regulations for the 1989-90 waterfowl and upland game bird regulations, finalizing decisions for a somewhat restricted chukar and Hungarian partridge season, a later season opener for ducks, and increased hunting opportunity for wild turkeys and sage grouse.

## Upland and Migratory Bird Seasons Begin Next Month

If, like most anxious eastern Oregon bird hunters, you've stopped by your favorite sporting goods store or licensing agent to pick up the new Oregon bird-hunting synopsis, you will doubtless have found they are not yet available. Since you probably won't get your hands on a set of these regs for another week or two, listed below is a rundown of the 1989-90 season dates and bag limits according to recently released information from the Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife.

**Pheasant**-The eastern Oregon runs from October 14 through November 26. The bag limit is two cock pheasant per day, with eight birds in possession. A special extended zone takes in much of the Columbia Basin, where the season runs until December 10. The season in western Oregon is slated for October 14-November 12 and, while the bag limit is still two birds per day, the possession limit there is six.

**Chukar and Hungarian Partridge**-Due to the harsh winter of 1988-89 and poor bird production this spring, a tighter season has been imposed for chukar and hunts this year. The general eastern Oregon season opens October 7 and continues through January 31, 1990, but in Wallowa, Grant and Malheur counties, the season ends December 31. In all areas, the daily limit is eight, with 24 in possession. Baker county has no open season for chukar or hunts.

**Valley Quail**-In western Oregon, Wasco and Hood River counties, valley quail may be hunted from October 14 through November 12. In eastern Oregon the season dates are the same as those for pheasant in each area, including the extended zone. The statewide bag limit is 10 per day with 20 in possession.

**Mountain Quail**-Hunters in Western Oregon, Wasco and Hood River counties began taking mountain quail August 26 and may continue to do so through January 7, 1990. Hunters are allowed 10 per day, with 20 in possession. Eastern Oregon has no open season for mountain quail, except in Klamath and Wallowa counties where two per day (two in possession), may be taken from October 14 through November 26.

**Wild Turkey** hunters have the opportunity to take two gobblers this coming season, which runs statewide April 11-May 20, 1990, provided they purchase two separate turkey tags before the tag sale deadline for midnight April 10, 1990.

**Sage Grouse**-For the first time in several years, hunters can apply for a special sage grouse hunt to run October 21-22 in 12 central and eastern Oregon units. Hunters awarded one of the 1,015 permits will be allowed two sage grouse. The deadline for applications is September 26. To apply, print the words "Sage Grouse Application" on a postcard. Enter up to two hunt numbers from the list below, noting your first and second choice. Print your full name, address and evening phone number on the card, and mail it to Sage Grouse, P.O. Box 470, Portland, OR 97207.

The hunt numbers, unit names and available permits are: 836 Paulina (south of Hwy. 20, 20 permits), 873 Wagonfire (100 permits), 874 Warner (100 permits), 870 Beatty's Butte (250 permits), 869 Steens (100 permits), 871 Juniper (150 permits), 865 Beulah (50 permits), 866 Malheur River (100 permits), 868 Whitehorse (100 permits), 851 Sumpter (10 permits), 864 Lookout Mountain (10 permits) and 872 Silvies (25 permits).

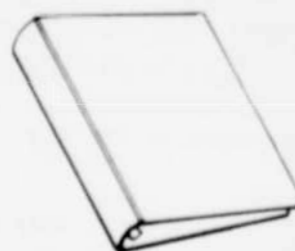
**Ducks**-Although duck hunters again have a 59-day split season, the opener comes a week later this season, running from October 21-November 8 for the first period and from November 22-December 31 for the second. Morrow and Umatilla counties remain open through January 7, 1990. The statewide daily bag limit is a combination four ducks, which may include no more than: three mallards (only one hen), one pintail, two redheads and one canvassback. The possession limit is twice the daily bag.

**Geese**-The general goose season runs October 14 through January 14, 1990, except in Baker and Malheur counties, where it closes on January 7. Some special regulations will again apply in parts of western Oregon. The bag limit in western Oregon, Baker and Malheur counties is two geese per day with four in possession. The eastern Oregon bag is three dark geese and three white geese per day, although Klamath and Lake counties do not open for white geese until November 1. Black brant season runs December 30 through January 14, and allows hunters two birds per day with four in possession. There is no open season on cackling Canada geese again this year.
