On Friday, September 15, the Heppner Mustangs traveled to Ritzville, Washington, and took on the Ritzville Broncos. The Mustangs scored first when fullback Doug Devin scampered up the middle 72 yards for the first score of the game. The extra point attempt failed. The Broncos struck next on a one-yard run by running back Mike Pratt. The extra point by Mitch Sielaff was good, giving the Broncos a 7 to 6 lead at the half.

The next quarter and a half was a defensive struggle until Heppner's Russell Britt, from his safety position, intercepted a pass and returned it 60 yards to set up another Doug Devin touchdown. Devin then punched the ball through for a two-point conversion, giving the Mustangs a 14 to 7 lead which is all they needed to hold on for the win.

Extension offers tips on stain removal

With school bells beginning to ring, many mothers are concerned about the morning rush to get the children up and ready for school, according to Carol Bennett, Oregon State University Extension Agent in Morrow County.

A few hours spent in getting organized will save lots of frustration during the morning rush hours.

Each night before the child goes to bed, pick out what will be worn the next day. Be sure to find shoes, socks and jackets as well. The child should help in selecting what is to be worn. Selecting clothes the night before will eliminate those unpleasant surprises-like finding lead pencil markings on your child's only pair of clean jeans.

Marking your child's shoes with right and left arrows inside under the heel will make dressing easier. Selecting shoes with nylon gripping

closures rather than ties or buckles will make it easier for your child to dress.

Even a super organized parent will encounter school-related stains. Suggestions for dealing with stains are listed here.

*Lead Pencil: Use an art gum eraser to lift off excess; avoid hard rubbing. For washable, durable fabrics, spray with an aerosol laundry pretreatment product. Rub in heavy-duty liquid laundry detergent. Rinse in warm water.

*Ball point pens, crayons on a limited area: Spray or sponge with dry cleaning solvent (per-chloroethylene or trichloroethylene). Next rub with heavy duty liquid laundry detergent before laundering. Rinse. Launder.

*Crayon in a load of laundry - Rewash load with laundry soap (not a detergent) and 1 cup baking soda. *Tempera paint and grass stains (these stains are difficult to remove) Pretreat the stain with a heavy duty liquid laundry detergent. Rinse thoroughly. Soak the stained garment in an enzyme pretreatment product to detergent containing an enzyme for a half hour to an hour. Rinse. If the stain is not removed, next soak the stained garment in a dilute solution of all-fabric powdered bleach.

As clothes are laundered, store matching sets together and always repair rips, tears, and replace missing buttons before clothes are laundered and put away. To cut down on confusion, store only one season's clothes in the child's room or at least have them separated. Too

Deadline nears for SBA aid

September 25 is the last day for small business owners located in Morrow, Umatilla and Wheeler counties to apply to the U.S. Small Business Administration for disaster loan assistance stemming from the drop in farm income due to the 1988 drought, according to John F. Gilman, director of SBA's local office.

Gilman said small, non-farm businesses and small agricultural cooperatives that suffered substantial economic injury as a direct result of reduced revenues to farmers and ranchers due to the 1988 drought are still eligible to apply for financial assistance. Nursery owners are eligi-

ble to apply without establishing a connection to the drop in farm income. Applicants must demonstrate substantial economic injury and must be unable to offset such injury through use of their own credit and personal resources.

Business owners may qualify for working capital loans of up to \$500 thousand to meet financial obligations which would have been met if not for the disaster. Loan terms will be determined by the applicants' ability to repay the loan—not to exceed 30 years. The interest rate for all loans approved under this disaster designation is 4 percent, said Gilman.

Enterprises primarily engaged in farming or ranching are ineligible for disaster loan assistance under this designation.

Gilman went on to say that to date only four disaster loan applications have been issued to small business owners in the above-named counties.
