The next meeting will be November 19 at Ann Bedortha's house. Members will be riding at the meeting.

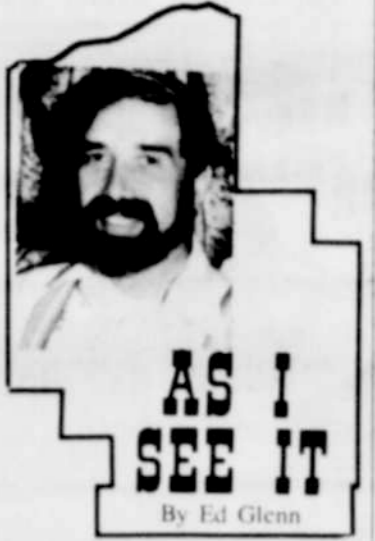
#### North Lex Livestock

### A Cheatham Mill



Everyone ought to have a Cheatham Mill. That way you would understand.

You see, we have this little herb business. You know, oregano, basil, chives, the stuff you cook with to make food taste good. We grow it, dry it, pack it in little jars and try to sell it. We even print the labels directly on the jars and build the little wood box that holds six different kinds in case you want to give somebody a really nice gift.

The herb business kind of replaced the wine business, you see.

So what about the Cheatham Mill?

Well, after the herbs are dried in a dryer of our own design (the secret is lots of air and not very much heat, some days in Boardman it's plenty hot without a heater) the leaves have to be stripped from the stems. You can eat the leaves but the stems are kind of hard and people don't like to buy stems.

There's two ways to strip the leaves from the stems. You can beat a handful against a board or something and the leaves all fall off. But that breaks up the stems too and you have to spend hours picking the little pieces of stem out of the leaves. Or you can pick up one stem at a time with one hand and pull it between the fingers of the other hand. That strips the leaves off and leaves the stem pretty much whole so you can throw it away.

Either way it takes a lot of time to strip very much thyme.

Thinking I could use an old hand-crank fanning mill up on an auction block not long, I up and bought it. I'm really dangerous at an auction sale. I guess that's why Francie lets me go to one only every five years or so.

I got my new treasure home to discover I was the proud owner of a not too proud Cheatham Mill manufactured by the Mason Campbell & Sons Co. of Detroit, for the John Deere Plow Co. of Portland, Spokane, Seattle and Boise. I couldn't find a model number anywhere but it's about 3 by 5 feet, stands 4 feet high, has a big hand-cranked sprocket and a bagging attachment.

And it was in much worse shape when I got it home than it looked to be when the auctioneer was pleading for another bid. Most things I get at an auction are.

Off and on all summer, I've been repairin' replacin' and a paintin' in the hopes to get the thing to separate herb leaves from the stems.

This morning it was time to locate a replacement screen that goes way down in the bottom. Where the weed seed is screened out. The original was nearly rusted away.

After fifteen phone calls all across the nation I can tell you a lot more about a Cheatham Mill.

Manson Campbell & Sons Co. must no longer exist. At least they don't have a phone and they're not the same as M. Campbell & Sons nor Campbell & Sons Manufacturing Co. (they make marine fixtures mostly for sail boats) both of Detroit. There's a screen manufacturer in Tennessee who will gear up to make an exact replacement for about \$1,000. There's an outfit in South Carolina that makes a Cheatham Mill except they use that for grinding recycled aluminum.

And there's a place in Portland that will sell a piece of screen that's pretty close for about \$40. At least that's a little bit less than the auctioneer got.
