"Our donation of wheat, added to the donation of the milling and formulations, will bring needed food to many through the Oregon Food Bank."

Certificates for donations have been mailed to Oregon's wheat producers and copies are also available at the licensed elevators in Oregon.

"Monetary donations by others are also welcome," said Reeder. "Checks can be written to the OWGL Food Bank Project and mailed to the OWGL office, P.O. Box 400, Pendleton, 97801."

Currently the beef processing industry is undergoing dramatic changes as to the kind of cattle they are willing to buy. Last year it was announced that a premium would be paid for live cattle that would meet certain criteria. At last year's Stockman Seminar, Excell Corpora-

tion and Dr. Bob Long from Texas Tech University, teamed up to show what direction the industry is going.

At this year's Stockmans seminar, "Beef production 90's Style," Dr. Bob Long will again describe how to select heifers that will produce the calves that will become the industry standards in the 1990's. Even if a producer doesn't sell to the large packers, producers will likely be affected as industry standards move in this direction.

Also in the 1990's producers will be faced with a larger array of opportunities from foreign trade, animal rights, and consumer concerns. Producers need to know what's ahead so that rational informed decision can be made.

On Saturday, December 2, at the Crook County Fairgrounds, the Jefferson, Crook and Deschutes Extension service offices, in conjunction with the county Cattlemen's Association, will be presenting a workshop on "Beef Production 90's Style."

Long and a member of the National Cattlemen's Association Beef Safety Assurance Task Force will be available to present beef production in the 90's. There will be live cattle on hand that Dr. Long will use to demonstrate his concepts.

The cost of the one day seminar is \$15 per person or \$30 per family. Preregistration is required by November 28. Cost after the 28th is \$25 per person. Lunch is a part of the registration. ## Alumni basketball tourney dates set

## Army Corps to consider lake level

The Portland District, U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, is evaluating the need for environmental analyses before further considering a change in the summer pool level of Willow Creek Lake at Heppner.

At a Corps public meeting Sept. 13, several lake level options were discussed. "Comments at the meeting and written comments forwarded to the Corps after the meeting generally favor operating plans to hold the lake at elevation 2076.5 through a portion of September," said a Corps news release.

The Corps currently is evaluating recommendations by state and federal fisheries agencies as they relate to the Corps' Final Environmental Impact Statement prepared for Willow Creek Lake. A Corps opinion on whether additional environmental review will be necessary is expected by Nov. 30, 1989.
