Northeast Oregon Wild and Scenic Rivers planning efforts. The four-person team for the combined Umatilla and Wallowa-Whitman National Forest rivers will be at the North Fork John Day District Office in Ukiah, December 5, public meeting 7-9 p.m. and at the Pendleton Indian Hills Red Lion, December 6, open house 3-6 p.m., public meeting 7-9 p.m.

The Forest Service is the lead agency for preparing management plans on the following rivers, or segments thereof, which were designated under the "Omnibus Oregon Wild and Scenic Rivers Act of 1988": Eagle Creek, Imnaha River, Joseph Creek, Lostine River, Minam River, North Fork John Day River, North Powder River and Wenaha River. The Wallowa River is identified for further study and possible inclusion as a Wild and Scenic River.

Woody Fine, team leader, is committed to giving the public "an opportunity to learn about the Wild and Scenic Rivers Act and to give the public the chance to be heard with their ideas or preferences." Fine also said he hopes that those citizens who cannot make the public meetings will contact the team either by phone or in writing with any questions or comments that they may have.

The rivers listed in the 1988 Act, a total of 40 State-wide, were designated by Congress because they are free-flowing and have at least one outstanding characteristic. The interim boundaries for each of the Wild and Scenic Rivers currently extends to 1/4 mile on each side of the river; public input will help to refine these throughout the planning process. The planning team hopes to complete the management plans for the eight rivers by October 1992.

Other public meetings to be held in Northeast Oregon will be at Imnaha, December 12 and Enterprise December 13.

Circuit Court Report

The following activity was reported in Morrow County Circuit Court last week according to Morrow County DA Jeff Wallace.

Donald Maurice Campbell, 33, Umatilla, plead guilty to Driving While Suspended on Friday, December 1. Circuit Judge Pro-tem Ralph Currin sentenced Campbell to one-year bench probation, \$500 fine, 30 days in jail (suspended) on the condition that the defendant get his license reinstated within 90 days, if eligible.

Roxie Noreen Feitshans, 25, plead guilty to Forgery in the Second Degree before Judge Robert Abrams. The defendant was sentenced to 90 days in jail, with credit for time served on 16 days, and the balance suspended. She was placed on one year bench probation on the condition that she make restitution totalling \$260, a CICA assessment of \$20 and a county jail fee of \$10.

Jody Allen, 21, Hermiston, was before the court on a probation violation. The defendant admitted the violation and his probation was revoked and reinstated on the grounds that he serve 90 days in jail with credit for time served of 30 days. The balance was suspended on the condition that he make restitution for checks written in Oregon and Washington.
