**John Day River
Ranked Number
One for Summer
Steelhead in 1988**

Eastern Oregon's John Day River produced more summer-run steelhead for anglers in 1988 than any other river in the state, according to steelhead punch-card data recently compiled by the Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife.

Approximately 7,366 steelhead were taken and logged by John Day River fishermen in 1988, though that success was actually the result of two separate steelhead runs: the 1987-88 run and the 1988-89 run. At any rate, the total catch for the John Day in 1988 numbered 224 greater than the state's second most successful summer steelhead fishery last year, the Columbia River below Bonneville Dam.

"Probably the most significant aspect of this whole thing is the fact that these (of the John Day River) are wild fish," said Errol Claire, QDFW District Fisheries Biologist for the John Day River Basin. We are able to manage the habitat and the environment in such a way that we've still got a river system that can put out that kind of fish. This is natural production; when you look at a lot of those other rivers, that catch is based on a mixed fishery, since all those other rivers have got hatchery stock. But the John Day is an entirely wild fishery, and it's right on top of the heap, so that's important."

Three other eastern Oregon streams also contributed to the state's list of top ten summer steelhead producers for 1988, including the Columbia River above Bonneville Dam, the Deschutes River and Hood River.

Slightly lower counts of fish passing the Bonneville and John Day Dams in 1988 plus poor water and fishing conditions around much of eastern Oregon during early 1989 will doubtless be reflected in this year's catch totals of the 1988-89 run, yet better water conditions and the somewhat higher dam counts observed this year could result in an improved fishery for the 1989-90 season.

"The run appears to be much better this year," Claire said of the John Day River in particular. "We're going to have to wait until we do our (spawning ground) counts, but I think this year is going to be a better year than last year."

Claire emphasized that while the number of steelhead counted past the John Day Dam was greater this year than the past two years, it is only a general indication of what can be expected.

"While we certainly use the dam counts as a rough indicator, we haven't been really successful in correlating run size with those counts. The difference is, we can't differentiate wild and hatchery fish; that's just total steelhead. Of course, we know the fish we are going to get (up the John Day) are going to be the wild segment."

The tables below suggest past angler successes on eastern Oregon summer steelhead rivers of the Columbia River system, compiled from data from returned salmon/steelhead cards. When noting the fluctuations in yearly catch totals of each river, Claire advises anglers to consider that steelhead run in cycles, and many variables influence the run size each year, often the result of stream or ocean conditions of several years prior.

"While we've had some good years, we need to realize that we are going to have some years that are not always going to be right out there on top."
