Tax help at Neighborhood Center

Jerry George, coordinator of AARP-IRS Tax Counseling for the elderly, said a representative will be at the Heppner Neighborhood Center on January 15 to answer questions and provide instruction for completing federal and state income tax forms.

George said that persons participating in the 30-hour seminar for preparing the personal income tax forms 1040, 1040A, 1040EZ, OR-40, OR-40S and OR-70 will be

requested to provide a minimum of 40 hours of free tax preparation assistance to the elderly, handicapped, non-English speaking or low income individuals.

There will be no instruction on preparation of business or farm tax forms. Questions pertaining to these forms can be directed to the toll-free number 1-800-424-1040. If a question refers to federal tax schedule A or B it can probably be answered, he said.

Lopez pleads guilty to separate charges

A Boardman man plead guilty Friday to two counts of Second Degree Attempted Assault in connection with a September incident near Boardman, according to Morrow County District Attorney Jeff Wallace.

Antelmo Lopez-Carmona, 18, was charged with attempting to strike two Boardman residents with a motor vehicle along a road near Boardman on September 2, 1989. He entered guilty pleas to the charges in Morrow County Circuit Court before Circuit Judge Pro-Tem Ralph Currin. Judge Currin ordered a presentence investigation, and continued the matter for sentencing pending completion of the PSI.

In a separate case Lopez-Carmona also plead guilty Friday in District Court in Heppner to attempted coercion in connection with an unrelated July incident, also near Boardman. In that case he was charged with attempting to coerce a Boardman resident into letting him have contact with her minor female dependents by threatening to file false criminal charges against her and by threatening to damage her property. Judge Currin continued the matter for sentencing pending completion of the PSI.

Course to cover fire management in forests

Most of the range and forest vegetation in the Pacific Northwest developed in the presence of fire. However, fire still is viewed primarily in a destructive mode, notes Tom Bedell, Extension Rangeland resources specialist with the Oregon State University Extension Service. To help better understand the role of fire both in the past and the present, a short course on "Fire in Pacific Northwest Ecosystems" will be held later this month.

The short course will cover all aspects of fire management both on rangelands and forestlands. The course content is organized into four sessions. The first deals with fire in the historical and the current context. The next session goes into effects of fire on the ecology of an area. The third covers management of burning in six different but common wildland systems; whereas, the last session deals with prescribed burning, smoke and air management, fire laws and regulations, and the economics of fire.

This short course will be held at the Red Lion Indian Hills Motel in Pendleton. It starts at 1 p.m. Tuesday, January 23 and concludes at noon Thursday, January 25. The registration fee of \$65 (before January 12, \$75 after) covers one lunch and the proceedings. Pre-registration is highly desirable because space can limit total numbers. To pre-register, call 503 737-3341 and ask for a registration form for the 1990 Pacific Northwest Range Management Short Course. The course is open to the public.
