Glenn publishes at his Boardman home, with the help of family members. Within the eight-page spread's first issue were stories of the new crane at Port of Morrow, the naming of the Riverside School gym after Dan Daltoso, retired RHS principal, the resignation of the Boardman Chief of Police, an introduction of Mark Eisele, Riverside's vice-principal, the recent windstorm and other general news and sports.

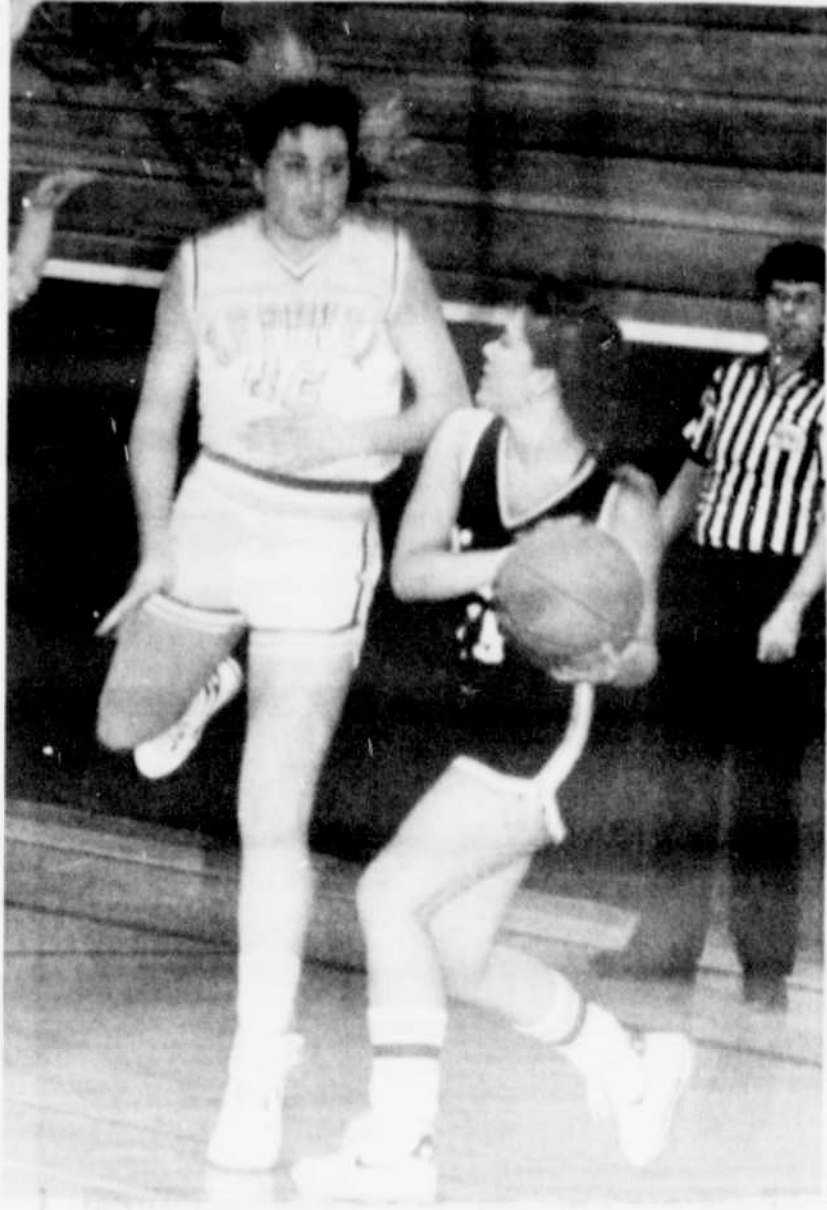

## Boardman man pleads guilty

A 20 year-old Boardman plead guilty Friday to first-degree burglary in Morrow County Circuit Court, according to Morrow County District Attorney Jeff Wallace.

James Mabe was charged with burglarizing a residence in Boardman in November and taking a number of personal items. He was later apprehended by the Boardman Police Department.

Circuit Court Judge Pro-Tem Ralph Currin ordered a presentence investigation, and continued the matter for sentencing, pending completion of the pre-sentence investigation.

## Hermiston woman sentenced

A 20-year old Hermiston woman received 18 months probation as a result of her guilty plea to unauthorized use of a motor vehicle, according to Morrow County District Attorney Jeff Wallace.

Tolly Marie Sater was sentenced Friday by Circuit Court Judge Pro-Tem Ralph Currin. She was charged with attempting to steal an automobile from the driveway of a private residence in Irrigon in September. She was caught while attempting to steal the car by the owner who had been awakened by the noise outside. The owner then subdued her until police arrived a short time later.

Judge Currin imposed but suspended 18 months in prison, and ordered Sater to undergo mental health evaluation and treatment as part of her probation, and to pay \$240 in court appointed attorney fees and a \$50 assessment to the victim-witness fund.
