

Mustangs rally to beat Wasco co. Redsides, 66-55

this Friday, Jan. 19 at Heppner.

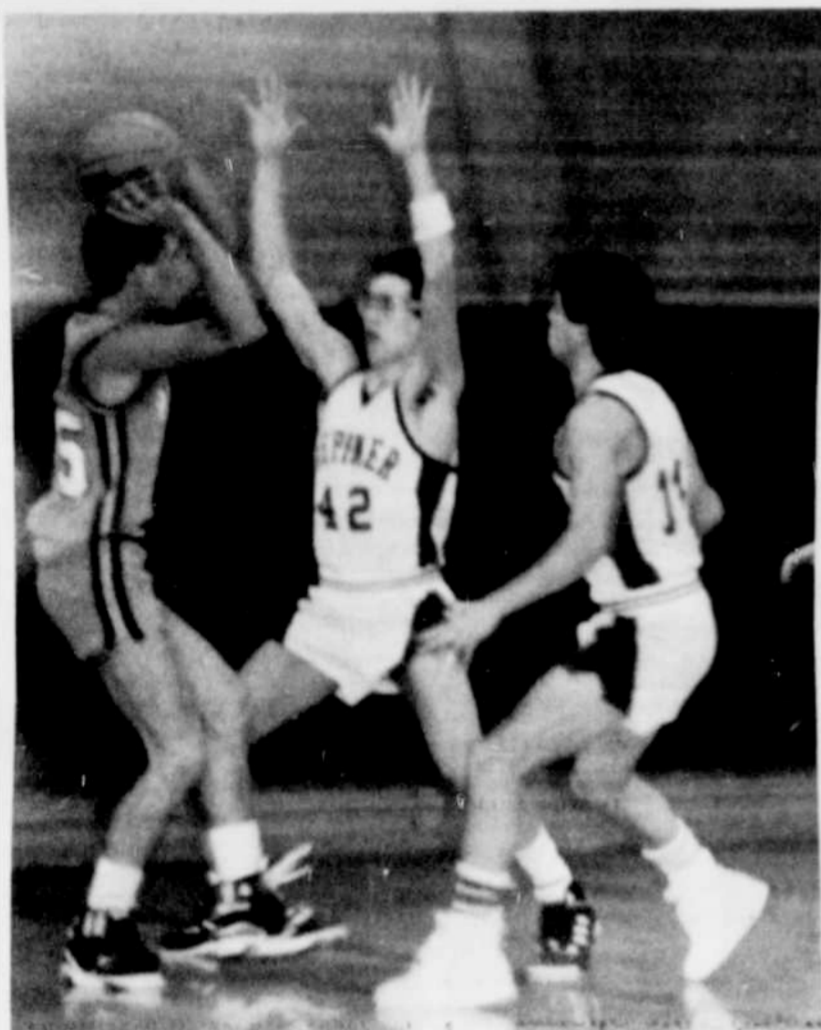

Fillies beat Redsides; tie for first in league

After playing four games in Columbia Basin Conference action, the Heppner Fillies are 4-0 and tied for first place with Weston-McEwen. The Fillies remained unbeaten in league play when they traveled to Maupin, Saturday, Jan. 13 and beat the Redsides 39-31.

Jennifer Currin scored four of Heppner's five points in a low-scoring first quarter as the Fillies had a slim one-point lead after one period of play. The Fillies connected on five of six free throws and three field goals in the second quarter to take a two-point lead into half time, 16-14.

Heppner increased its lead in the third quarter as they outscored Wasco Co., 10-6, and went into the final period leading 26-20. The Fillies outscored the Redsides, 13-11, in the final stanza and picked up the important road victory 39-31.

Jennifer Currin led the Filly scoring attack with 16 points, while Nikki Brisbois and Dulcie Palmer each added seven points.

Coach Dowdy said "I'm pleased to be 4-0 in league right now, particularly since we have a lot of improving to do before we can play our best ball."

The Filly victory and a Weston-McEwen victory over Wahtonka set the stage for an early CBC showdown this Friday between the two undefeated teams in the league. The first meeting between Heppner and Weston-McEwen will be on the Fillies home court and will start around 6 p.m. On Saturday, the Fillies will travel to The Dalles to battle the Wahtonka Eagles who are 2-2 in league play.

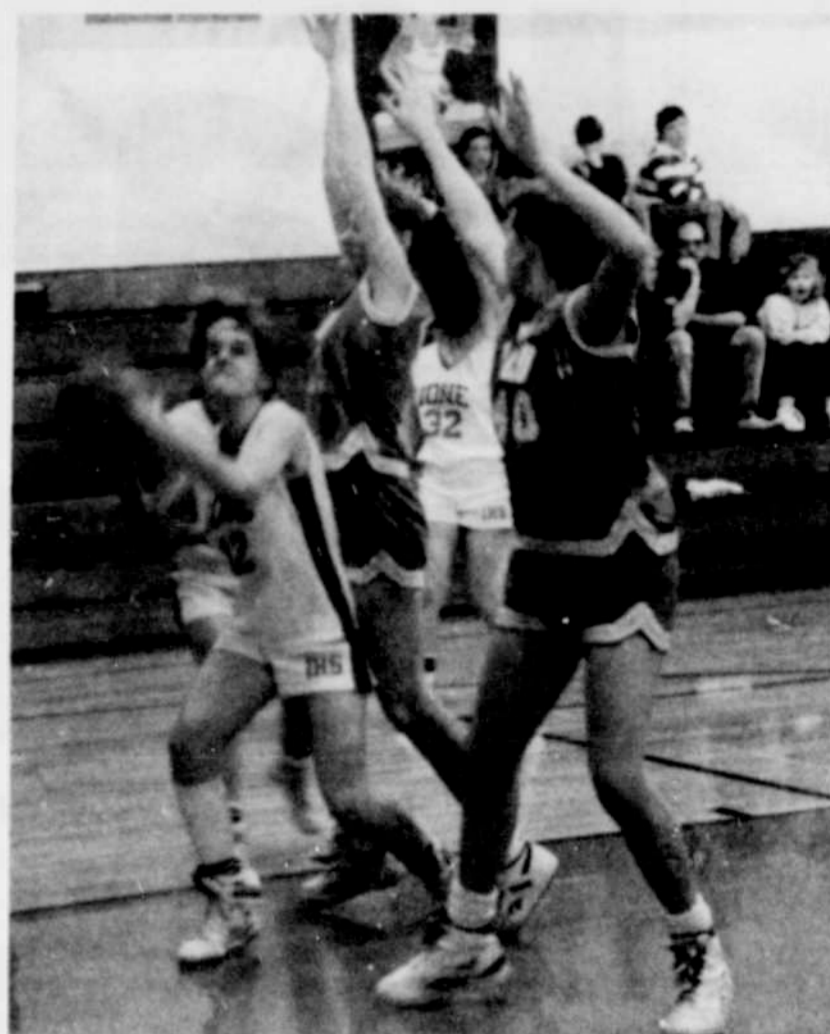
The downside for the Lady Cardinals was that they came down to their opponent level and did not play good basketball, according to coach Dana Heideman. The girls lacked intensity and made mental errors but were still able to command the game. The Cardinals led 13-6 at the end of the first quarter and held a 21-11 margin at the half. A second half scoring blitz put the game permanently out of Echo's reach as the Cougars managed only five second-half points to the Card's 23.

Jo Cupps, playing just two quarters, made 17 points to be high-point scorer for the game. Kari Morgan added nine and Amy Wagenblast chipped in eight. Jo Cupps also led in rebounds, pulling down 11 boards. Freshman guard, Crystal Minster added nine as the Cards outrebounded the Cougars, 59-23. Darcee Padberg and Nancy Morter managed four steals each to lead the Lady Cardinals.

The game wasn't pretty in the eyes of lone coach Dana Heideman, but it allowed him to try some different plays and player combinations. He also found the game to be a good chance to give his younger players some playing time. Heideman said senior Jo Cupps had a good game, gathering 17 points and 11 rebounds in just two quarters.

Saturday night, Jo Cupps needed just two quarters to pour in 24 points and lead the Lady Cardinals to a 62-32 thrashing of the Arlington Honkers. Once again, coach Heideman was able to rest his five starting seniors for two quarters and play his younger players, with pleasing results.

The Cards outscored Arlington,

18-5, in the first quarter with Jo Cupps contributing 12 of those points. Their halftime edge was 27-12. In the third quarter, the five seniors, Jo Cupps, Mary Cupps, Darcee Padberg, Linda Morter and Amy Wagenblast combined to score 25 points with everyone making at least one bucket. Impressive teamwork and a tenacious half court press made the difference. The younger players finished off the marathon-length contest which saw Arlington commit 36 fouls, sending Ione to the free throw line 40 times.

Heideman was pleased with his entire team's performance. He praised the work of his starters, saying they worked very well together and concentrated on teamwork. He also singled out sophomore Kari Morgan for putting together a good, all-around game.

The Lady Cardinals travel to Condon this Friday and host Culver on Saturday. Heideman predicts closer more exciting games this weekend.
