

Extension plans financial class

Thinking of refinancing your mortgages at a lower rate? How long before the savings from the lower rate pays the cost of refinancing?

Perhaps you have wanted to compare the monthly payment amounts for 24, 36 or 48-month auto loan?

Does building a \$50,000 college fund within 15 years seem utterly impossible?

How long will your pension payout last if you withdraw \$1000 a month? How long if you pull out \$2500 a month?

Using a hand-held financial calculator, an individual can compute the answers to a wide variety of these basic but fairly complex financial questions.

If you want to know more about using financial calculators, you can attend a "hands-on" workshop on Thursday, March 1. The class will begin at 7 p.m. at the Extension Office, Pettyjohn Building, Heppner Highway, Heppner. Carol Bennett, Morrow County Home Economics Agent, will be the instructor.

You do not need to own a calculator to take the class. The Extension Service will provide calculators to use during this "hands-on" activity. There is a \$4 charge for this workshop to cover the cost of your personal manual/workbook. Pre-registration is necessary. Class size is limited to 15 students.
