

Stafford Hansell named to Ag. Hall of Fame

Stafford Hansell, Boardman and Loyal Creswell, Aumsville, will join the Agricultural Hall of Fame of the Oregon State University College of Agricultural Sciences during a program Feb. 20.

The two will be inducted during the annual Agricultural Appreciation Dinner at O'Callahan's Restaurant in Corvallis. Tickets are on sale until Feb. 12 through the college's academic programs office.

The honor, begun in 1980, recognizes individual contributions to agriculture in the areas of production, processing, distribution, service and government. Hansell and Creswell will be the 27th and 28th persons honored.

Hansell's career focused on public service. He was a member of the Oregon House of Representatives from 1957 to 1975, serving on the Emergency Board and as co-chair of the ways and means committee. He later became director of the state ex-

ecutive department and was a State Education Coordinating Council member.

While in the Legislature, he supported OSU programs in animal science and veterinary medicine, said Steve Davis, head of animal science, who nominated Hansell for the honor.

Hansell and his brother, William, bought the town of Ordinance in 1960 and established a swine operation that was, until recently, the largest hog operation west of the Rockies. The two brothers shared the title of Conservation Man of the Year in 1977. They installed the first center-pivot irrigation circle in Oregon.

Hansell, past president of the Oregon Agri-Business Council and past member of the Land Conservation and Development Commission, serves on the national board of Common Cause and chairs the Columbia Gorge Commission.

Irrigon man sentenced

A 21-year-old Irrigon man was sentenced February 2 on a drug-related charge in Morrow County Circuit Court, according to Morrow County District Attorney Jeff Wallace.

Robert Gene Morely had plead guilty earlier to possession of meth-amphetamines as a result of an October, 1987, incident. Circuit Judge Pro-Tem Ralph Currin imposed but suspended a two-year prison sentence, placed Morely on two years formal probation, ordered him to serve 75 days in the Morrow County Jail, pay a \$50.00 victim/witness assessment, and reimburse the state for the cost of a court-appointed attorney. Judge Currin also imposed a range of drug-related probation conditions, including mental health evaluation and treatment.

The conviction culminated an earlier investigation by the Morrow County Sheriff's Office and the Oregon State Police.
