The Winter Knowledge Master Open for elementary students was held February 7 at Heppner Elementary School. 1296 teams of 5th and 6th grade students participated in the United States and several foreign countries. This computer-based contest, calling for both knowledge and the ability to quickly apply that knowledge, has become a popular

challenge in schools. The costs are low in that no travel is required, yet students can compare their efforts with thousands of teams around the world.
